Assault Charge Holds CCC Pair to Grand Jury

Walter Jones, 18, and Gilbert McPeter, 23, of the Elkton CCC camp, were today ordered held for the grand jury on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon, following a preliminary hearing in the justice court. The two enrollees were accused of striking Thor Jensen, Elkton, former wrestler, with an iron bar during an altercation at a dance at Elkton. The pair were continued in custody in lieu of \$500 bail.

Bridges Linked to Communists by Witness' Story

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—(AP)—A one-time communist from Los Angeles furnished the first direct testimony purporting to link Harry Bridges with the communist party at the CIO longshore leader's second deportation trial.

Ezra Chase, who said he joined the party in 1931 when he was "unemployed and confused but later dropped out," testified yesterday that at the party's orders he attended a labor meeting in September, 1931, at which Bridges was the speaker.

Bridges at that time, Chase continued, advocated a program endorsed by the party, calling for a drive to convert the American Federation of Labor from a craft to industrial type of union and push it "further to the left" in an effort to use the workers to advance a revolutionary movement.

Department of justice attorneys contend Bridges is deportable to his native Australia, under the 1940 alien registration act, as a member or ex-member of an organization advocating violent overthrow of the government.

Bridges advised the gathering, the ex-communist testified, not to try to get AFL unions to "chip off in small chunks" and go to the CIO but rather, by electing CIO-inclined delegates to labor councils and conventions, swing the unions over to the CIO.

Girl Beaten for Refusing Loan to Drunken Uncle

OAKLAND, Calif., April 3.—(AP)—A 14-year-old girl lay near death here today from a beating. District Attorney Ralph Hoyt said her uncle attacked her because she refused to loan him ten cents for another drink, after he came home intoxicated.

At the hospital doctors said Jeanette Augustus had less than a 50-50 chance to live, and that if she did not die, she probably would be blind.

Under arrest District Attorney Hoyt said, was Berton Waldrum, 33, unemployed. Hoyt said Waldrum confessed he hit the young girl seven times with a garden hose in which a piece of steel had been inserted. She suffered a frontal fracture of the skull and deep lacerations. Physicians said, too, that arteries in her throat were ruptured.
