

Legion Junior Baseball Plans Launched Here

Umpqua post of the American Legion has completed organization of its committee to handle Legion Junior baseball during the coming spring and summer months. L. H. Wimberly, who is expected to be reappointed as district chairman, will be in charge of schedules and arrangements. Roy Young and James Young will be in charge of ticket sales and gate. Charles V. Stanton is publicity chairman, Irving Riegel is grounds chairman and George Trapalis is transportation chairman.

The activity is expected to get off to an unusually successful and early start this year as the result of renewal of baseball in Roseburg high school. Chairman Crouch reports that an advance sale of season tickets is planned to finance the activity during the early part of the season.

Rains and Winds Damage North California Crops

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A. Scott, state department of agriculture statistician, said the heavy rains, driven in some sections by winds of gale force, had damaged fruit and other crops. ALBANY PLYWOOD STRIKE ENDS; PAY BOOST GRANTED

ALBANY, Ore., April 5.—(AP)—The Western Door & Plywood company's plant at Albany will resume Monday after nearly a month of idleness when 147 members of millmen's local No. 1528 of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners return to work.

Settlement of a strike which started March 12 was voted unanimously at a meeting attended by 110 union members here last night.

The union accepted terms of an agreement drawn at a meeting of the company officers and Herman Schmunk, union business agent, with William Kinsey, representing the state labor commissioner and Albany chamber of commerce representatives.

The workers agreed to return at present wages, with the understanding that the minimum be increased to 55 cents an hour May 1, with corresponding increases in other brackets.

since the start of the war, numerous German actions unfriendly

or detrimental to American interests, among them:

Requested withdrawal of American diplomatic and consular officials from numerous German-occupied countries. (The German embassy here and consulates throughout this country continue to function.)

Seizure of the American flag ship "City of Flint."

Refusal to grant safe conduct to the American ship "American Legion" with repatriated Americans from Finland, and refusal to grant safe conduct to the "Manhattan" on which it was planned to evacuate Americans in England and Ireland.

Vieled threats to sink American vessels carrying supplies to England or Ireland.

Extension of the sea blockade into waters three miles from Greenland, pushing the war to the doorstep of the western hemisphere.

next few days will say if another state of Europe not at all interested in the conflict will be dragged into war.

The newspaper Il Messaggero, meanwhile, urged Yugoslavia to "clarify" her position without delay, thus indicating that Italy

has not abandoned hope of a peaceful solution of the crisis in Belgrade's relations with the axis.

"The forbearance shown by Italy and Germany in the present condition should prompt responsible persons in Belgrade to careful consideration of the circumstances of the situation," Il Messaggero said.

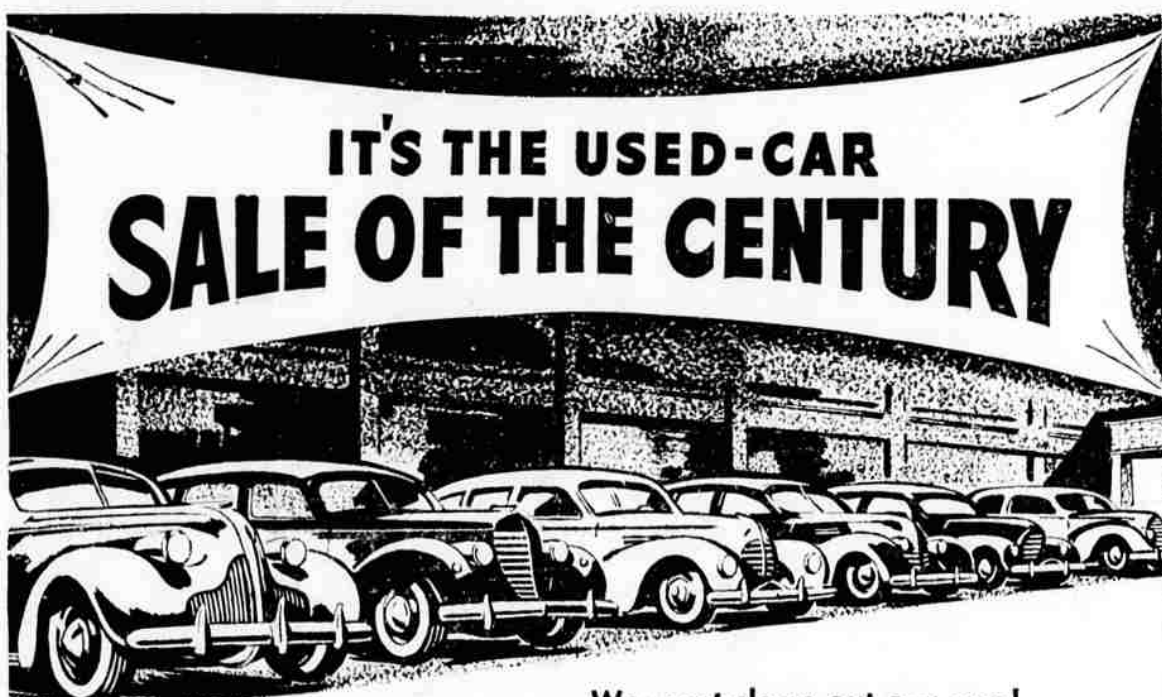
