married?

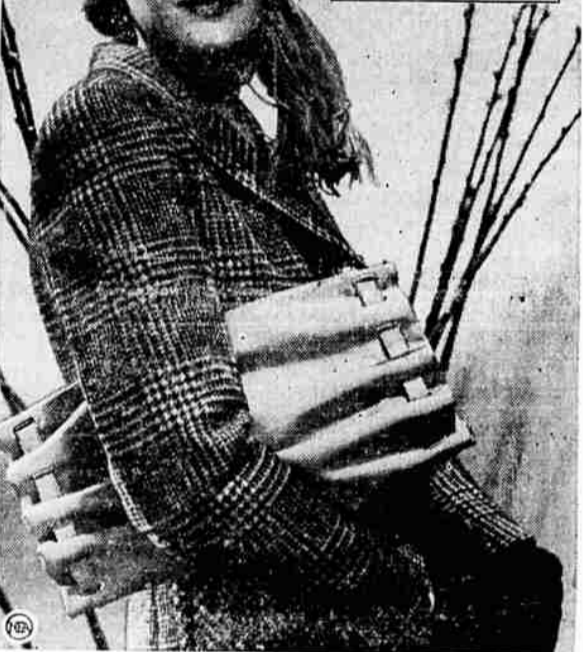
