

Marketing Day To Draw 350 Here

Approximately 350 persons, including 300 eighth graders and their teachers, will be in Roseburg Saturday to participate in the 4-H Marketing day program, sponsored by the agricultural committee of the Roseburg chamber of commerce. The group will arrive at 8:30 and meet in the Lockwood Motor company show room, where they will be organized into groups of approximately 30 each and sent on tours. These tours will include visitations to departments of the courthouse, manufacturing concerns, U. S. forest service, U. S. weather bureau and many other places of interest to them, until noon. They will have lunch as guests of the Roseburg businessmen at the armory during the noon hour. Following that they will be guests of Don Radabaugh, local theater manager, at their choice of the two theaters.

The Marketing day program is for those eighth graders who have completed the 4-H marketing project in conjunction with their state textbook work in agriculture.

A. W. Coleman Is Taken by Death

A. W. Coleman, 59, died Sunday evening at his home, 324 E. Washington St., Roseburg, following a long illness. He was born Sept. 21, 1881, at Morris, Manitoba, and was married at Twin Valley, Minnesota, Oct. 20, 1904, to Amelia Hagen.

Surviving are the widow and a daughter, Mrs. Daniel Keohane, Roseburg.

Mr. Coleman became a resident of Roseburg in 1938, when he came from Grand Forks, North Dakota, following retirement from the Northern Pacific railroad, which he served as freight and passenger agent for many years.

He was a member of Masonic orders and the Episcopal church. Funeral services will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors at 2 p. m. Tuesday, Rev. Perry Smith officiating. Masonic rites will be conducted by the local lodge. The body will be taken to Portland for final rites.

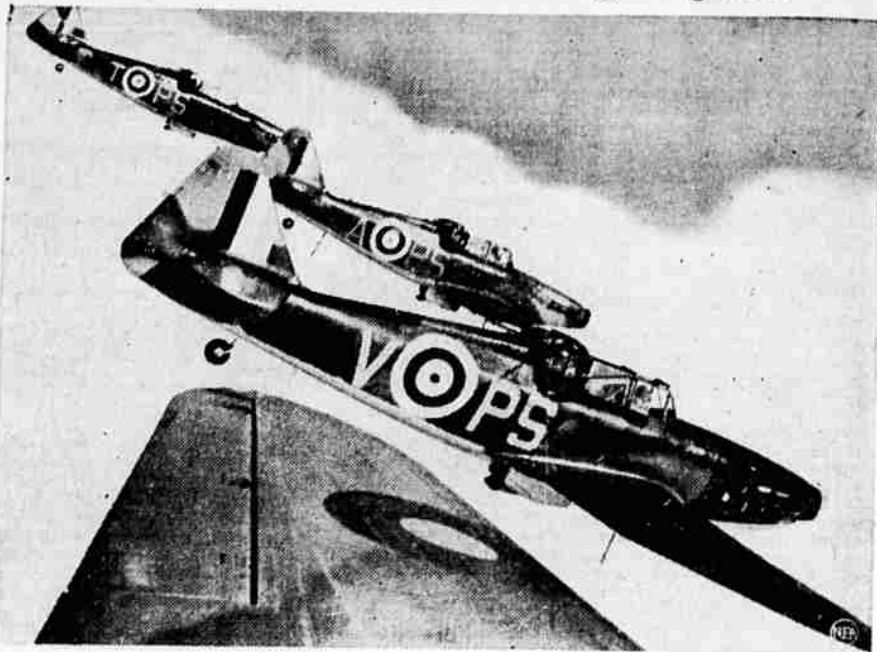
Youth Wins Battle for Freedom From Mine Trap

CENTRALIA, Pa., April 7.—(AP)—Eighteen-year-old Joseph Loftus didn't even wince today while hospital nurses changed dressings on his hands worn raw by digging his way out of a coal mine cave-in 60 feet underground where he had been trapped for 52 hours.

Except for a deep cut on his head—he was knocked unconscious by a falling timber in the slide which entombed him and a fellow worker last Friday at 11 a. m.—Loftus was pronounced in good condition by doctors.

Miners dug their way to Leonard Burns, 45, on Saturday morning, but had almost abandoned hope for Loftus, who had been
