

Free Mattress Material Ready For Distribution

Families needing mattresses have the opportunity of securing high quality mattresses without cost (except for the small charge of 85 cents to cover cost of twine, needles and other incidental expenses in construction) under the cotton mattress program sponsored by the surplus marketing and agricultural adjustment administration, according to J. Roland Parker, county agent. Materials, such as cotton and ticking, are furnished without cost by the surplus marketing administration, and local distribution of these materials is made through the county agricultural conservation association by the AAA. Members of eligible families will be required to make the mattresses under supervision in mattress making centers to be established in various sections of the county. In addition to the mattresses, a comforter is allowed along with each mattress where needed and desired.

Time for filing applications for mattress and comforter materials has been extended to April 10 in order to give every eligible family in Douglas county an opportunity to make application for mattress and comforter materials. Any applications dated by April 10 and mailed not later than the evening of that day will be accepted. All applications should be mailed to the county agricultural agent, Roseburg, Ore.

Eligible families include: The farm family with a net income of \$500 or less. However, where there are more than 4 members in a family, \$50 additional may be added to the net income for the fifth or sixth member, making a maximum of \$600 net income. The net income is figured after deductions for hired labor, cost of feed for livestock and poultry, cost of seed, fuel and oil for farm machinery, taxes and interest paid, in connection with farm operations; the part time farm family is eligible where the net income is not over \$500 for a four-member family and \$50 for each additional member, or a maximum of \$600. Deductions from the gross income from the farm and outside labor are limited to operation expenses of the farm or \$100, whichever is greater. The non-farm family to be eligible must have a gross income of less than \$500 with no deductions. This applies only to families living in rural areas or in towns of less than 2500 population.

More than one mattress may be secured by a family. The family of one or two persons may secure one mattress; two mattresses for a family of three or four members; and a maximum of three mattresses allowed for a family of five or more members.

Families in various communities of the county who are familiar with the cotton mattress program are requested, states Mr. Parker, to contact families in their respective communities who are known to be in need of mattresses and comforters in order that all eligible families may have an opportunity to take advantage of the cotton mattress program. It is expected that the actual construction of mattresses will not begin until sometime in June. Complete details and information on the cotton mattress program may be secured by calling at the county agent's office, in the Federal building at Roseburg, or by writing for information and application forms.

Increase in Deposits Shown by U. S. Nat'l Bank

In its report to the United States comptroller of currency as of Friday, April 4, the United States National bank, which has one of its important units in Roseburg, lists deposits at \$172,344,941.01, which compared with deposits of \$162,522,442.08 at the time of official call as of December 31 shows a gain of \$9,822,498.93. Compared with deposits

of approximately the same period a year ago of \$138,015,495.53, the 12-month gain is in excess of \$34 million dollars.

In its growth during the past year this bank climbed from 56th in size among all banks in the United States to 49th, and from 106th in the English-speaking world to 80th in comparative size.

General Season On Trout in Oregon To Open April 12

Come what may—sun, rain, snow or hail—the rod and reel boys of Oregon will be on the open waters of the state next Saturday, April 12, for the opening of the general trout fishing season.

The general bag limits for game fish over six inches and both steelhead trout and salmon, when less than 15 inches in length, is 15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day, or 30 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 40 fish in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time. Variations from this general bag limit have been set in certain lakes and anglers are asked to refer to the 1941 fishing synopsis for this information as well as other special regulations. Copies of the new regulations may be obtained from all license agents and sporting goods stores. The season closes October 15.

Fee Changes Made

Only two changes in license fees were made by the state legislature. One provides the special vacation license fees for both residents and nonresidents at \$3 for ten days, effective after July 1, 1941. Up to that time the special two-day vacation license for \$2 may be procured. The other change came in license fees for persons over 65 years of age who have resided in Oregon for ten years or more. Such persons may obtain a special fishing and hunting license for 50 cents, providing that each applicant first make an affidavit that he or she is unable to pay the regular \$5 fee. These special licenses will be available after the law becomes effective on June 14.

An important change in regulations affects use of live minnows in waters of Oregon. Live minnows may not be used in angling for any game fish in any waters except only in those streams and lakes known to contain spiny-rayed fish, and then only when the minnows are used as bait in the same waters from which they have been taken.

Steelhead are classified as trout in the Rogue river and all its tributaries and all laws regarding trout are there applicable to steelhead. Open season for trout six inches or over in the Rogue river and its tributaries is April 12 to December 31, both dates inclusive, except that in tributaries of the Rogue river above Gold Hill, the open season is from April 12 to November 30, both dates inclusive.

Report Your Catches All fishermen are requested to obtain catch report cards to be filled out and sent to the game commission after each fishing trip. Cards are postpaid and require no signature. Data contained on these cards will be used to augment findings of survey crews operating in various parts of the state and will aid in providing better fishing in Oregon. Portland office of the game commission

Fishermen should remember that it is always unlawful:

To release within the state of Oregon any species of birds, animals or fish brought from another state or country, or raised in captivity or in a domestic state in this state, without first having obtained a permit from the Oregon state game commission that the same may be done.

To transport any fish from any stream, lake or body of water in the state of Oregon to another stream, lake or body of water within said state without first having obtained a permit from the Oregon state game commission that the same may be done.

To fish by any means other than with hook and line.

To use more than 1 line or line and rod held in the hand.

To use more than 2 blades on a spinner for lake or stream fishing.

To use more than 3 hooks on a line except on floating bass plugs.

To sell, or offer for sale or exchange any fish taken with hook and line.

To fish without a license on person.

To refuse to show license on demand.
