Wyoming State English Teacher Found Dead

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., April 8.—(AP)—Prof. Francis Weitzman, 35, head of the English department of Wyoming State college, Cheyenne, was found dead today in his apartment.

Coroner Harry R. Eames said death was probably due to a heart ailment.

Weitzman, on a year's leave of absence because of ill health, was formerly associate professor of literature at Cornell university. He was a graduate of Niagara university and the University of Vermont.

New Judgeship Goes to E. M. Page, Salem Lawyer

SALEM, April 8.—(AP)—Governor Sprague announced last night that the new Marion county circuit judgeship created by the last legislature would be filled by E. M. Page, 47, member of the Salem law firm founded by U. S. Senator McNary.

His appointment may be delayed, the governor said, until after the summer recess of court. The law creating the new judgeship is effective June 14. Page was graduated from Willamette university college of law in 1913.

Jas. W. Bartram, Pioneer, Passes On

James William Bartram, 75, pioneer resident of Douglas county, died at his home on South Pine street this morning following a short period of illness. He was born at Green valley, west of Oakland, Oregon, May 18, 1865, and spent his entire life in Douglas county. He was married to Miss Permelia Evelyn Threlkeld at Tyee June 10, 1888. He also resided in Dodge canyon district and made his home on Oak creek, northeast of Dixonville, where he lived for seven years before coming to Roseburg in September, 1935. He was a member of the Christian church.

Surviving are his widow, and two children, Orville Bartram, of Hubbard, Oregon, and Elmer Bartram of Wilbur. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Sarah Gaskill, of Spokane, Washington, and a half-sister, Mrs. Estella Payne of Hillsboro, Oregon. Also surviving are five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas funeral home Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. John A. Barney of the First Christian church, officiating. Interment will follow in Wilbur cemetery.

Ace Sub Commander of Nazis Nabbed by Britons

LONDON, April 8.—(AP)—The British admiralty declared tonight that Commander Otto Kretschmer, noted Nazi submarine commander, was one of 450 prisoners they have taken from U-boats which have been sunk.

A communique also said that the British counter measures against the U-boat menace had recently met with "greater success."

"In August, 1940," the admiralty said of Kretschmer, "he was decorated with the knights cross of the Iron Cross. Last December Hitler bestowed on him the oak leaves denoting a higher class of this decoration. He recently received promotion."

(Reports from Berlin showed that as early as last November 4 the claim was made that Kretschmer had topped the 200,000-ton mark in sinkings. On Dec. 16 Germany officially placed his score at 250,000. He was promoted from lieutenant commander to commander March 21.)

Reedsport Man Facing Drunken Driving Charge

John L. Helmeck, 47, of Reedsport was brought to Roseburg last night by Deputy Sheriff Harry McCabe of Reedsport, and was held in custody in lieu of \$500 bail on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

Referendum on Cigaret Tax Bill Will Be Tried

SALEM, Ore., April 8.—(AP)—State election officials said today they expect preliminary petitions to refer the cigarette tax bill to the voters to be filed in the state department by tomorrow, but they did not disclose who would circulate the petitions.

If signatures of 15,866 registered voters are obtained by June 13, the bill, instead of becoming law June 14, would be on the

November, 1942, general election ballot.

The bill, taxing cigarettes two cents per package to raise \$1,500,000 a year for old age pensions and \$300,000 for vocational education, was passed by the legislature in the closing hours of the session, and was signed by the governor last week.

Mines Close Ferry Route Between Britain, Ireland

LONDON, April 8.—(AP)—The Great Western and the London, Midland and Scottish railways disclosed today they had closed one passenger ferry route between England and Ireland (Eire) "for reasons of safety."

An alternate route is in effect, railway offices said, after stating that the main route was closed yesterday. There also is a commercial air line connection between England and Ireland.

Authoritative quarters declined comment. Informed sources, however, pointed out that the Irish sea had been heavily mined for months.

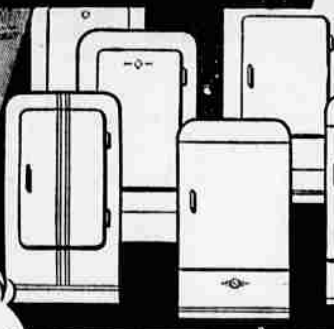
