

Joe Louis Beats Musto But Shows Class Below Par

ST. LOUIS, April 9.—(AP)—On the basis of his showing against Tony Musto, heavyweight champion Joe Louis has a mighty rough summer ahead of him.

Musto entered the ring last night unimpressed and unimpressed. He left it eight and a half rounds later at Referee Art Donovan's orders, bloody but unhurt except for a cut over the right eye.

The stubby Chicago Italian was the fifth straight victim fed to the champion in his stop-a-month tour and it was an unimpressive and perplexed Louis who needed almost a half hour of action to win.

Great in the past against good foes, Louis was even below the calibre he displayed two weeks ago in disposing of big Abe Simon at Detroit.

Musto's bobbing and weaving made the champion miss frequently. The Chicagoan fought in such a crouch his head was almost at a right angle with his belt buckle and he appeared as though he were busy all the while looking at his shoelaces.

Despite the time Louis consumed there never was any doubt as to the ultimate winner of the bout that lured 17,472 customers who paid a gross of \$52,993.75 to attend a ceremony a majority didn't expect to go beyond the third round.

The champion, sluggish at 203½ pounds, punched Tony to the floor in the third but Referee Donovan got only to "one" before the challenger, who weighed 199½ despite the six-inch difference in height,

was back in his half-crouch.

Louis couldn't straighten Tony up and his right hand wasn't sharp enough to come up from below.

After the scrap Louis said the hand never had healed completely from the ruckus with Simon two weeks ago.

Musto's first comment after reaching his dressing room under his own power bore out Louis' statement.

"He doesn't hit any harder than any of the other fellows I've fought," said Musto.

Galento Quits Go With Buddy Baer; Inquiry Ordered

WASHINGTON, April 9.—(AP)—His comeback attempt smashed by Buddy Baer's methodical jabbing and a somewhat mysterious injury to his once potent left hand, Tony Galento was just another bandaged-up heavyweight fighter today.

Tony, claiming his hand was broken, quit after six rounds of a scheduled 10-rounder with Baer last night, and Buddy, the Livermore, Calif., giant, was awarded a seven-round technical knockout.

Dr. Marvin McLean, District of Columbia boxing commission physician, examined the badly-beaten Galento's hand in the ring as fans and officials crowded around. Dr. McLean refused to confirm Galento's claim of a break or serious injury and when Tony failed to appear early today for a x-ray examination at a hospital,

the commission ordered the fight's share of the purse held up.

The commission announced an inquiry would be started to determine whether Galento was able to continue the fight.

Tony landed his left hand on Baer's face just before he went to his corner at the end of the sixth yelling he was hurt. One of his handlers started to remove Tony's glove, and when the bell rang for the seventh Referee Eddie Lafond awarded the fight to Baer.

The New Jersey barkeep was bleeding from the nose and numerous small cuts about the face from the third round on. In the sixth, when Baer landed a score of painful jabs and twice jarred Galento with right uppercuts, Tony looked ready to call it a night.
