Retailers Urged To Attend State Meet at Eugene

The effect of national defense activities on retailing, how unemployment compensation affects merchants, merchandise returns and exchanges, improvement of collections and a number of other vital topics for enterprising merchants will be discussed under the leadership of experts at the fifth annual conference of the Oregon Retail Distributors' Institute at the University of Oregon April 16 and 17. It is announced here by Thomas Parkinson.

Mr. Parkinson, a district adviser of the institute, is assisting with arrangements and urges retailers of Roseburg to join with others from all parts of the state for this event.

The institute will open its session Wednesday, April 16, with the annual banquet, at which Dr. Donald M. Erb, university president; E. B. McNaughton, president of the First National bank of Portland; and Richard G. Montgomery, assistant manager of J. K. Gill and company, president of the institute, will speak.

Thursday morning will be given over to a series of addresses by experts in the various fields of merchandising, and discussion on each of the topics will be held in the afternoon.
