Public Utilities Taxes Give Douglas \$162,862

SALEM, April 10.—(AP)—Public utilities in Oregon will pay \$6,915,816 in taxes during 1941, or 16.6 per cent of the total property tax bill in the state, the state tax commission said today.

Electric companies will pay \$2,699,496, steam railroads \$2,394,565, telephone companies \$905,602, water companies 79,529, electric railroads \$77,781, tank car companies \$54,407, gas companies \$397,066, telegraph companies \$43,029.

Multnomah county will receive the largest amount from the utilities, \$2,744,390. Klamath county is next with \$425,886.

Other county totals include: Douglas, \$162,862.
