POLLYANNA CLUB HAS FINE MEETING

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Mother-Son Deaths Have Strange Angle

SEATTLE, April 11.—(AP)—A strange infatuation Mrs. Laura Lamb, 43, had demonstrated for a famous world war flier now with the Canadian R. A. F. in North Africa was one of the angles Coroner Mittelstadt considered today in his probe of the deaths of Mrs. Lamb and her 23-year-old son, Roy Terrence Lamb, Lamb.

Officers, who at first pronounced it a case of double suicide when the bodies were found in the Lamb home yesterday, today widened their investigation before making a final decision.

Their first theory was that the youth, returning home last Monday to find his mother dead in the bathtub, became grief-stricken and stabbed himself in the heart with a knife.

Mystery was added to the case, however, when an autopsy last night indicated she had died, before her son, from a knife wound in the chest.

Mittelstadt planned to compare the youth's handwriting with notes found in the house. Two of these notes, apparently written by Mrs. Lamb, were addressed to her husband, Harry Lamb, 49, en route home from the east, and to the flier.

Deputy Coroner Brill said neighbors told him Mrs. Lamb appeared to be infatuated with the flier after reading a series of magazine articles about his exploits. They said, Brill reported, Mrs. Lamb had told them she and her husband had known the flier in their younger days in British Columbia but that she had not seen him for years.

Officers found two radiograms from the flier in the house. Both were from Cairo. One spoke formally of pleasure at having heard from Mrs. Lamb and the other was a Christmas greeting.

Skiing Conditions at Crater Lake Said Good

Prospects are for excellent skiing conditions at Crater Lake over the week-end unless there is an unexpected weather change, according to word received this morning at the local headquarters of the Umpqua national forest. Thirty inches of new snow fell during the past week, but has packed to about 18 inches with breakable surface. Total snow depth is 108 inches, an even nine feet. Maximum temperature yesterday was 40 degrees and the minimum last night was 11 degrees. Roads are open and in good condition but it is advisable to carry chains. V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua forest, reports.

BOSTON, April 11.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The Boston wool market has been quiet this week. What little business has been done has been on a steady price basis."

"In the west, buying has occurred at scattered points, with prices somewhat erratic but generally on a firm level compared with recent purchases. The volume has not been heavy."

"Foreign markets are firm, with the selection in primary markets now rather poor."

"Manufacturers appear to be in a digestive mood with orders on their books for from four to six months and for the most part

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comfortably covered with raw material.

"Mohair has been very active in Texas, with some of the big regular users buying. Adult has been advanced to 55 cents to the grower and kid hair to 75-77 cents."
