

First Day's Drive For Salvationists Nets 30 Pct. Goal

The Salvation Army campaign for funds to carry on its program of relief and character-building activities for the next twelve months got under way in Roseburg yesterday and will continue today and through Friday. Chairman W. C. Harding states that it is hoped that the full amount of the goal—\$1500—will be reached on the closing day of the campaign. The first day of the general solicitation, which does not include a number of the office buildings and larger business establishments, reached 30 per cent of the goal. Another tabulation will be made today and Mr. Harding and Captain Chas. Cox, the director of the drive, hope that the total amount today subscribed will be 80 per cent of the total goal.

A number of citizens gave cash contributions and a number gave pledges payable monthly, etc. Contributors that prefer may pledge an amount to be paid quarterly or four to six months later, if they do not wish to donate cash just now. The officer in charge of the local work will call at the designated time for the payment of the pledges. Mr. Harding further states that if all citizens of Roseburg will give a donation according to their donating capacity the total will be assured on Thursday evening.

Another meeting of the advisory board is called for Thursday evening at 5 at the chamber of commerce, at which time a complete report up to that time will be made.

"Each evening transient men are calling at the local hall of the Salvation Army for food and shelter, and your contributions to this drive will help feed and give lodging to such men who would otherwise be turned loose to roam the city streets and call at your homes. These inconveniences will be overcome if sufficient funds are made available when the goal is reached," Mr. Harding states.

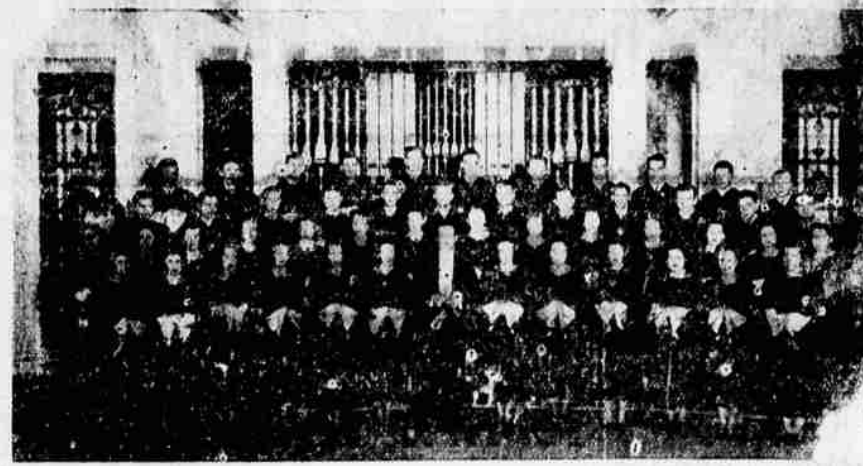
