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"fairly heavy" with some damage to industry but relatively few casualties. Liverpool was among the targets most heavily attacked.

Reports from Berlin said two persons were killed, other injured and buildings destroyed in British bombings of northern Germany.

German long-range guns on the French coast lobbed shells across the channel in brilliant sunshine this afternoon for the first time in more than a fortnight, firing at two-minute intervals.

Soviet Still Aids China
In the far east, it was reported that, despite soviet Russia's new 5-year non-aggression accord with Japan, Moscow has informed the central Chinese government that Russian aid to China in her fight against Japan will continue.

Domei, Japanese news agency, broadcast a report that attacks by British troops along Thailand's Malayan frontier has provoked a protest by the Thai government to British authorities.

Presumably, the British troops included many thousands of Australians who were rushed to the defense of Singapore. Britain's great naval base, and thence to the Malayan-Thailand frontier when it was feared Japan might attempt to strike at Singapore via Thailand.

Mexico City suffered damage estimated unofficially at more than \$1,000,000 when heavy shocks wrecked buildings and started a fire in the industrial area that leveled a square block.

The tremor, which began with violent shocks lasting five minutes in Colima, tapering off in a series of lesser tremors, apparently centered in the historic earthquake center of Chilpancingo, about 50 miles inland from the Pacific coast resort town of Acapulco.

(Chilpancingo is about 700 miles due south of Laredo, Texas.)

Destruction and undetermined numbers of casualties were reported from Guadalajara, capital of Jalisco state and Mexico's second largest city; Manzanillo, important Pacific coast port; and a dozen other cities across the country—as far east as Matamoros in Vera Cruz state, which borders on the Gulf of Mexico.

Wyoming highway crews broke through a foot or more of snow to the plane after the wreckage was sighted from a Continental transport plane yesterday.

Crumbling of Yugoslav Defenses Reported Near

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clared today:

"The remnants of the Serbian army are nearing dissolution. The number of prisoners and the amount of booty is increasing hourly."

Hundreds of British prisoners, including engineers from the midlands, Australia and New Zealand have also been taken by German infantry units after "hard fighting" which drove the defenders from mountain strongholds in Greece, DNB, official German news agency, reported today.

Premier Mussolini's high command said Italian troops had captured Yugoslavia's chief naval base at Split in a 240-mile thrust down the Adriatic sea coast, and that the town of Erseke, Albania, 30 miles south of fallen Corizza, had been retaken from the Greeks. The fascists were said to be pressing on toward the nearby Greek frontier, rapidly approaching a junction with the Germans.

Defense Still Stubborn
Greek front-line dispatches said the Germans suffered heavy losses in knifing a 65-mile salient into northern Greece, converging in twin drives from Salonika and Bitolj pass.

There were strong indications, too, that the allies were rallying to a stonewall defense after the Nazi breakthrough.

After jubilantly declaring that the campaign in Greece was becoming a "rout," the Germans subsequently admitted that the blitzkrieg invasion was now meeting "stubborn opposition," and a Nazi spokesman in Berlin said laconically:

"The Balkan war has entered upon a new phase."

"Our army has succeeded in compelling the British forces in Greece to make a stand and face us in combat. We have crossed their plans."

This appeared to be an oblique admission that the British were not planning a "Dunkirk" flight from Greece, as Berlin propaganda had previously asserted.

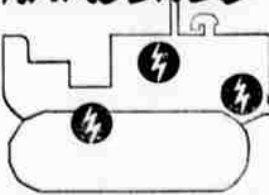

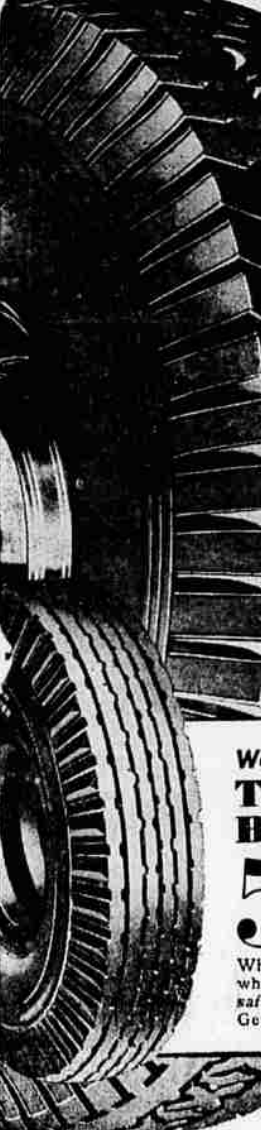

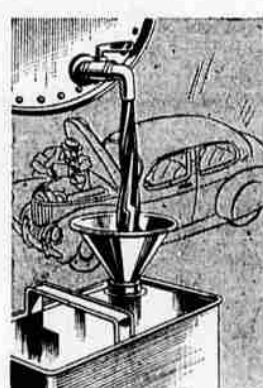
