

Senators to Ask F. D. R. to Intervene in Coal Deadlock

About 20 southern senators and representatives decided today to ask president Roosevelt to intervene in the soft coal wage dispute which closed down most mines in the eight-state Appalachian area April 1.

The congressmen, headed by Rep. Kee (D., W. Va.), acted after a group of southern coal operators told them "we have done everything we possibly could do" to settle the wage differences, which hinge on demands by the United Mine Workers union and northern operators that the southerners give up a 40-cent wage differential in their favor.

While major attention centered on coal, with army ordnance offices reporting steel production curtailment in the Chicago, Pittsburgh and Cleveland areas due to coal shortages, there were stoppages at two industrial plants.

The AFL Chemical Workers union struck at the Monsanto Chemical company's plant at Monsanto, Ill., demanding wage increases and a closed shop for 900 employees, and the CIO Steel Workers organizing committee sponsored the second stoppage in two weeks at the Buffalo, N. Y., plant of the American Car and Foundry company. A union official said the company would have to consent to a collective bargaining agency election to end the stoppage. There are 1,400 employees at the Buffalo plant. A picket was grazed by a rifle bullet near the plant of the strike-closed Birdsboro, Pa., Steel Foundry and Machine Works. Pickets were on duty also at the company's Reading, Pa., plant and union officials said production had been stopped.

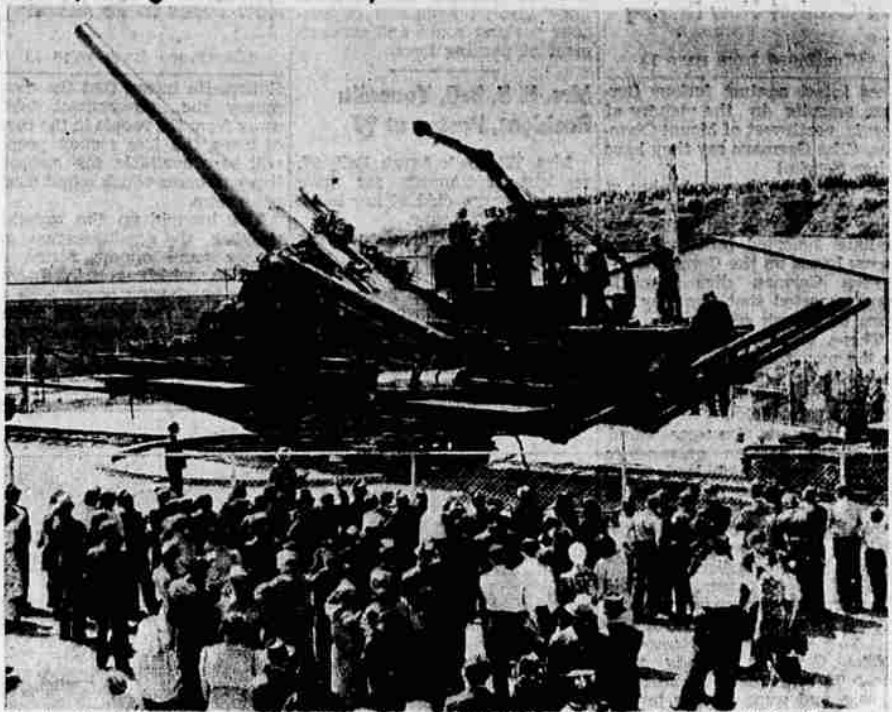
