## 2-Time Army Deserter Gets 3 Years for Theft

PORTLAND, Ore., April 18.—(AP)—Frank E. Mason, 21, deserter from two armies, was ordered to serve a three-year federal penitentiary sentence for automobile theft yesterday. Federal Judge Fee, who revoked Mason's parole on an automobile theft conviction, said "you have deserted from two armies just because you won't take orders. You will probably do what you are told from now on."

Mason joined his old national guard company at Seattle, went AWOL, was sentenced to the guard house, escaped and went to Vancouver, B. C., where he enlisted in the Canadian army. Probation Officer Cochran told the court, Mason deserted from his Canadian outfit last week, Cochran added.

## Jury Disagrees in Sheep Case at Crescent City

CRESCENT CITY, Calif., April 18.—(AP)—Failure to reach a verdict after 13 1/2 hours of deliberation brought dismissal of the Del Norte county superior court jury which heard testimony in the case of Carl Wood charged with receiving stolen property.

Eleven of the jurors voted to acquit the Grants Pass riding academy operator but one held out for conviction. Wood, Lloyd Edgerton, Charles Hornbarger, John Eller and Harvey Watkins were arrested in connection with the operation of an alleged sheep rustling ring. Wood pleaded innocent to charges of grand theft and receiving stolen property. The other pleaded guilty to grand theft and that charge against Wood was dismissed. Edgerton, Hornbarger, Eller and Harvey asked probation. Wood was ordered to appear in court May 5 for further action in his case.
