

Jobless Benefit Denied To Picket Line Dodgers

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—(AP)—San Francisco longshoremen who refused to pass a picket line and then tried to collect unemployment benefits have been rebuffed by the state supreme court.

The petition, which asked a writ of mandate to force the California employment commission to distribute about \$300,000 to nearly 4,000 men, was denied by the court without comment.

Some time ago the supreme court ruled that persons who leave their job voluntarily by refusing to pass through a picket line are not entitled to unemployment benefits.

The longshoremen sought to force payment of the benefits after the commission had set aside a referee's decision in favor of the petitioners.

Differences Between Americanism And Alienism Defined by Roseburg Student in Prize Winning Essay

A cash prize of \$25 is soon to be publicly presented to Alyce Carolyn Moon, senior in Roseburg high school, who was awarded first place in the state essay contest recently conducted by the Americanism commission of the I. O. O. F. grand lodge of Oregon.

Miss Moon's essay, "Americanism versus Alienism," was selected by judges as the best of hundreds submitted from all parts of the state. Plans are being made locally for a public meeting, at which the award will be presented.

Following is Miss Moon's essay: Americanism versus Alienism has become an issue to many thinking Americans today because of the foreboding events among European nations whose people and ideals are similar to our own.

But what is Alienism? Scholarly considered, the word is seen to have been derived from the Latin "alienus" meaning "stranger." In a larger sense, it is not one who is a stranger to

our ideals of life and living as well as to our privileges of citizenship.

Americanism, formally defined, is "custom peculiar to the United States." It is to us Americans that feeling for our national home which we term "patriotism." It is personified in our heartfelt salutation of the symbol of our free country—the flag—in place of the person of a maniacal dictator.

Lost are the opportunities of numerous democracies to glory in their nationalism—lost through their lack of unity, patriotism, and enthusiasm for the nation rather than merely through their lack of military preparation.

Our leaders have seen this; our civic organizations have seen it; and now our people are seeing it. America rises with one emotion of many manifestations. That emotion is "God Bless America," "Lend us to Britain," "conscription of youth," or any one of a thousand other articulate expressions of lesser magnitude but no less love and loyalty. tried in upstate New York last summer in army maneuvers. In pursuance of this plan the army called today for a half million civilian volunteers to man an air raid spotting system, capping a series of swift defense moves which reflected the grave attitude of government officials toward the mounting war crisis abroad.

Auto makers agreed to curtail production of pleasure cars and commercial vehicles by 20 per cent in order to build more armaments.

Four new, speedy freighters were requisitioned from private owners for transfer to Britain.

A bill intended to reduce defense strikes by requiring a 25-day cooling off period was reported to the house for debate amid predictions that it would be passed in a week.

To Expand Bomber Output. A new major expansion of the nation's aircraft industry to meet an urgent British need for heavy bombers was reported reliably today to be under consideration by officials in charge of the lease-lend program.

Three or four additional plants to turn out long-range bombers—the backbone of aerial striking power—were described authoritatively as projected.

The proposed new plants would be in addition to four already under construction in the middle west which were designed to turn out 3,000 bombers annually from parts prefabricated in automobile factories.

then, however, and President Wilson organized a price committee with Bernard M. Baruch, of the war industries board, as ex-officio chairman.

When prices continued to soar, congress set up the food administration and the fuel administration. The former, under the guidance of Herbert Hoover, licensed dealers and issued schedules of fair prices.

Nevertheless, the cost of living rose about 85 per cent from 1915 to 1920. Baruch has since stated that inflation of prices made the world war cost the United States an additional \$15,000,000,000.

BOSTON, April 18.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Wool has been very inactive on Summer street this week. Small quantities of foreign greasy and scoured wool have been sold at firm rates. Some scoured domestic has changed hands at barely firm rates and little interest has been shown in spot domestic greasy wools.

"In like manner, buying has been desultory at country points, with prices generally firm.

"The manufacturing situation has changed hardly at all during the week. Spinners and combers quote firm prices on very little new business. With machinery sold ahead five to six months, they are not keen for new orders.

"Foreign markets are steady to firm with stocks of good wools very much cut down.

"Barely a half-million pounds of mohair is said to be left in Texas, latest purchases there having been at 57 cents for adult and about 80 cents for kid."

Berlin Suffers Worst RAF Attack of War

equalled "retaliatory" raid on London.

Authorized sources said the Prussian state library, already undergoing repairs as a result of the RAF raid on the night of April 9, again was damaged by a hit from an incendiary bomb.

Three other "public buildings" and "about 10 apartment houses" were damaged, the high command said, minimizing casualties.

"Despite the warning which the German air force made night before last by a tremendous retaliatory attack on London stronger forces again penetrated as far as Berlin's outer anti-aircraft barrage," said the daily communiqué, adding that "single planes succeeded in pushing through the fire belt to the city center."

While the British were striking, the Luftwaffe was delivering another strong blow at the British south naval base at Portsmouth, the high command said, and heavy damage was declared done to the harbor area and docks with high explosives and incendiaries.

Lair of Nazi Warships Also Feels RAF Blows

VICHY, France, April 18.—(AP)—The French information office announced today that 76 persons were killed and 50 wounded in a recent night RAF bombardment of Brest and the casualty list was still incomplete.

It was reported that the British planes, starting at 11:30 p. m. dive-bombed the port continuously until 1 a. m., the night of April 14-15.

The information office said the bombing was "the most terrible Brest has known" and said rescue squads still were working to uncover victims.

A civil hospital was demolished, but no other particulars of the material damage were disclosed.

The British say the German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau have been sheltering at Brest.

Nazis Hurl 10 Divisions, 1,000 Planes at Allies

tured and 12 British armored cars were destroyed.

With the Germans at grips with New Zealand and Australian divisions in northern Thessaly, informed Germans said however that the battle in general was going ahead according to schedule.

Announcement by the high command that the remnants of the chopped-up Yugoslav army

had surrendered and that fighting had ceased was acclaimed in Berlin as a milestone on what Germans regard as an irresistible march to victory.

"It means more men, equipment and a greater concentration of brilliant leadership for the job which lies ahead in Greece," said German observers.

General Simovic, who took over the Yugoslav government when the pro-axis regime there was ousted, was said by German sources to have fled the country—"which probably is best after all," one spokesman commented. The whereabouts of young King Peter was viewed here as an "interesting question."

Ominous for Greece.

As for the military outlook in Greece, a German spokesman said the best indication was the British and Greek communiques themselves.

Greece's destiny "soon will be that of Serbia," he said.

There was an inclination among informed quarters to view the Serb capitulation as just the first phase of the "Serb-Greek campaign."

Five Greek divisions were put out of action when the Germans drove through Macedonia to Salonika, it was stated.

As far as German forces were concerned, it was stated by military sources, the Yugoslav capitulation after 12 days of lightning battle was "almost without bloodshed."

How soon the Yugoslav spoils will be divided may depend upon how quickly the fighting is ended in Greece, informed sources said, but Croatia seemed destined to assume some sort of nominal independence, perhaps similar to Slovakia's, the rest of the kingdom appeared headed for partition.

It was made known that a Ger-

man minister has been appointed to the new Croat government at Zagreb.

ROME, April 18.—(AP)—The Italian high command indicated today that fascist troops have completed occupation of the Yugoslav coast.

On the Greek front, the daily war bulletin said, Italian forces recaptured Premet, Argirocastro and Porto Palermo, Albania, as the Greeks fell back in disorder.
