FORMER ROSEBURG WOMAN WINS SWEEPSTAKES PRIZE FOR SPRING FLOWER SHOW

Of special interest here is the recent announcement made that Mrs. Frank Penepacker, 3503 S. E. Glenwood, Portland, is the winner of the sweepstakes prize in the recent Spring Flower show in Portland for her yellow Banksia rose. Mrs. Penepacker was formerly Lillian Flint of Roseburg.

An editorial by Dean Collins, recently published in the Journal, regarding the Banksia rose will prove of special interest here and a part of the editorial is as follows: "When folks down in California complained, in their recent rainstorm, that Oregon climate had temporarily shifted into California, they ignored the possible corollary that some of California might have shifted into Oregon. At any rate, it was a yellow Banksia rose that won the sweepstakes in the recent Spring Flower show—and there has long been a legend that Banksia will not grow this far north."

"The late Agnes James flouted the theory and proved her point years ago by having a Banksia bloom in her yard out at Briarwood. So did Roy Hennessey, out at Hillsboro, growing a Banksia over one of the buildings on his place, regardless of the fact that sometimes you get zero weather out there."

"Mrs. Frank Penepacker, of 3503 S. E. Glenwood, has a Banksia that seems never even to have heard a rumor that such roses can't grow this far north. The roof of the garage is covered with the masses of yellow bloom and there's another vine just like it covering the back of the same garage. They've been there about eight years. It was from the largest of these that the sweepstakes bouquet for the Spring Flower show was cut.

"This bush came north by degrees. Mrs. Norah Flint, mother of Mrs. Penepacker, brought it from California to Roseburg and found that it did well there. When she moved to Portland and out into Eastmoreland, she took slips there and started the bush which is at present proving so effectively that Banksia will thrive here."

Ed. note: Mrs. W. H. Fisher, who now resides in Laurelwood, formerly had a Banksia rose, while she was residing on East Douglas street. The only Banksia rose so far discovered here this week by your editor is a deep ivory colored Banksia at the residence of Postmaster and Mrs. L. L. Wimberly. Considerable discussion has been enjoyed this last week by gardeners here as to whether or not there are any Banksia roses in this locality.
