

Greenberg, Other Stars of Baseball Caught In Draft

N. Y. Giants, Boston Red Sox at Top of Leagues; Cincinnati Still to Post Triumph

Just as intended, the army draft is striking both the mighty and the meek of baseball.

A selective service board in Detroit ended the confusion surrounding the status of Hank Greenberg yesterday, and knocked the Tigers out of the American league pennant picture—by classifying him definitely I-A and announcing he would be inducted into the army about May 7.

Another draft board disclosed yesterday that Cecil Travis, star shortstop of the Washington Senators, had been classified I-A and probably would be called next month about the time Third Baseman Buddy Lewis of the same team is to be inducted. Joe Marty and Hugh Mulcahy of the Phillies also will be lost to the team.

The towering home-run hitter was the most valuable player in the American league and no club can lose that kind of keystone and go ahead as though nothing had happened.

League Races in Mess
In the meantime the races in the two leagues are muddled more than usual.

In the National league the undefeated New York Giants are on top and the World Champion Reds are on the bottom without a single victory. The Boston Red Sox are unbeaten leaders of the American league while five clubs are tied for second with an even split of their games to date.

The Reds were routed 4-1 by the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday in spite of the fact that Bucky Walters went swif for six innings. Then in the seventh Van Rensselaer opened with a homer and Vince DiMaggio smacked another with two teammates on base.

The St. Louis Cardinals suffered their first defeat when the Chicago Cubs got rough with Shoun in the seventh inning on three extra base blows, the last a homer by Nicholson, and won, 6-4.

The Giants made peacoup of the Phillies 7-2.
Brooklyn's Dodgers, who hadn't won a game previously, had one given to them at Boston, where the Bees blew up with six errors and handed over an 11-6 decision.

Homers Decide Games
The Red Sox stayed unbeaten with a 3-2 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics. Lefty Grove held the A's to two hits for seven innings, but one of these was a two-run homer by Chapman in the fourth. In the seventh Doerr hit a home run for the Sox and in the ninth he smacked another with a mate aboard to win the game.

Home runs also decided Detroit's 4-2 triumph over the Cleveland Indians. Each team got six hits. Two of the "Tigers" were homers by Gehring and Tobetts.

Washington revengeed its opening day defeat by the New York Yankees by shelling Russo for a dozen hits in four frames and won out 7-4.

Old Ted Lyons, usually a Sunday specialist, proved he could be just as effective on a weekday by leading the Chicago White Sox to a 6-3 verdict over the St. Louis Browns.

He foresaw "retaliatory legislation which will set back the labor clock by years," unless strikes decreased.

"The public, he said, 'blames only labor,' no matter who is at fault in a strike.

The hard hitting Roseburg high school Indians downed the Myrtle Creek Vikings 7 to 2 in a well played baseball game at Myrtle Creek Friday afternoon.

For the first four innings the game was a pitching duel between Debernardi and Sellers, the latter holding the Indians hitless, while the Vikings gathered only one solid blow off Debernardi's offerings.

The Indians found the range in the fifth inning when, with one out, Wiard singled to right and Hughes drove out a long liner for three bases. Wimberly followed with a single, scoring Hughes. Schrimpf rapped out a double. Goodlow forced Wimberly at the plate and Talbert was tossed out for the third out of the inning. In the first of the seventh the Indians again went on a rampage, scoring five runs on five hits, a walk and an error.

Debernardi allowed only three hits and secured 11 strikeouts. He wavered in the seventh, however, when Myrtle Creek scored both of its runs and was relieved by Melvin Baker, who pitched the remainder of the game without allowing a hit.

of the new entrance.

The lighting system also is to be changed and will be narrowed down to 500 feet instead of embracing the entire width of the field, as at present, and will include the entire length of the new runway.

Easier Approach Provided
The change of location in the runway will make a better approach possible, as at present the extreme south end of the path is not usable in take-offs and landings because of proximity to a hill. The new location will make it possible for planes to approach the field at less angle of descent and thereby making it possible to use more of the runway.

The project has received an appropriation of \$81,541 from the WPA. Mr. Dawson reports, to which will be added the sponsor's contribution of about \$5,000, plus a considerable amount of materials and equipment.

Nazis Slaughtered in Attack on Allied Line

bringing up heavy guns to supplement the bombardment by their Stukas, which fly over 20 and 30 at a time.

The British army headquarters here declared repeated nazi attacks by armored formations and infantry "have been repulsed" and said the attackers failed to penetrate the line at a single point.

Rail Junction Falls

(The German high command reported today that Larisa, Greek city 40 miles south of Mount Olympus, where British troops have been reported fighting, had been taken and that the swastika had been hoisted on Mount Olympus.)

(Larisa, smashed by a recent earthquake and by bombings, is an important junction on the main rail line leading from Salonika to Athens.

(The city, which has a normal population of 25,000, previously had been abandoned by the civil population. Persons who reached Athens after visiting Larisa recently said the quake-smashed ruins of the city had been bombed by 40 planes at a time.)

Anzacs Repulse Trap

An Australian detachment, surrounded by a German battalion near Serbia, northwest of Olympus, was reported to have fought its way back to British lines, taking 150 prisoners. The Germans were said to have lost 300 dead.

On the fighting front, the Greek high command said "all enemy pressure" had been repelled by the allied defenses around Mount Olympus on the eastern end of the defense line, in the central valley of the Aliakmon river and around Grevena in the central sector further west.

Premier General Simovic of Yugoslavia today blamed the swift German entry into Croatia and the lack of "prior collaboration with the allies" for the speedy defeat of the Yugoslav armies.

In a military analysis of the war released by the Yugoslav legation, the prime minister, as head of the government in exile, expressed determination to "go on fighting at the side of our al-

lies until final victory."

ROME, April 19.—(AP)—The Italian high command announced today that Italian troops were advancing against Greece all along the Albanian front and that Greek troops were falling back in disorder under continual air attacks.

Fuel Hoist at Lumber Plant Damaged by Fire

The city fire department was called this morning to the wood yard at the Roseburg Lumber company plant, when fire started in a gasoline-driven fuel hoist. The fire caused considerable damage to the motor and equipment but did not spread to adjoining property.
