Radio Talk Will Deal With Govt. Workers, Defense

A radio broadcast expected to be of special interest to local persons in the employ of the U. S. government, as well as to the general public, is announced by station KRNR for 5:30 p. m. Wednesday, April 23. The broadcast will be a transcription of a speech given recently in Washington, D. C., by Luther C. Stewart on the subject of "The Federal Employee and National Defense." Mr. Stewart is national president of the National Federation of Federal Employees and has spent 45 years in Washington as a representative of federal employees. The broadcast is scheduled to run for 15 minutes and will be introduced by Bob Harvie, president of Roseburg local union, No. 459, of the National Federation of Federal Employees, which now has a membership in excess of 100, from the local employees of the various federal agencies located here.

DR. CHAS. A. EDWARDS: That religion should be a preventative religion. In the field of medicine doctors have discovered that it is far better to prevent a disease than to cure it after one has contracted it. Consequently, we have made much progress in curbing diseases. However preventative religion has lagged far behind, and today we are in need of a religion that will prevent people from falling as well as one which helps people after they are in trouble. The report of a recent committee on the study of crime is appalling when we learn that crime costs us thirteen billion dollars in America during a single year. Father Flanagan of Boys Town in Omaha says that the reason for the increase in crime among the youth is because they are not being taught religious principles. In other words, we do not need more reformatory schools and prisons, but we need a deeper religion to prevent the boys from falling in the first place. Today let us put God in the center of our lives. God is the only one who can keep us from falling. "Unto Him who is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of Glory. This God is able to keep that which we have committed to His care." Amen.

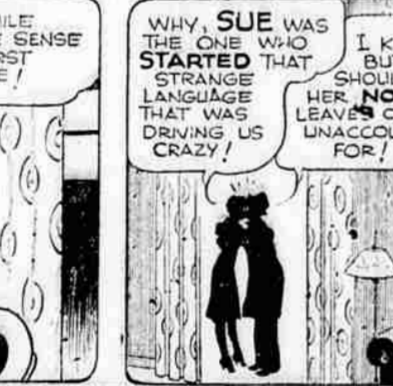
