It will consist of tables and benches, garbage pits, stoves, rest rooms, and tents, etc. Each member was assigned a certain phase of the work.

Mrs. John Ferguson met at Lavadour Friday with her Rose and Flower Garden girls. For roll call each member answered by suggesting a name for the club. "The Spring Blossom club" was the name chosen. Discussion was held on preparation of soil, transplanting, starting seeds in flats, cutting starts, proportions of fertilizer, sand and garden soil, also care of seeds. Seed catalogs were studied. For the next meeting each member was assigned topics, as follows: Alice Mae Welch, name six native shrubs that can be used in gardens and the date and time of blooming; Lois Ellen Matthews, general culture practice of gardens and flowers; Maxine Wright, give a list of perennials, their care, where different types can be used, etc.; Hazel Welch, name diseases of evergreens, shrubs, and flowers and what to do to

combat them; Josephine Wright, give information on transplanting shrubs and evergreens; Mildred Spore, name six shrubs purchased from catalogs, tell where they can be purchased, where to be placed for best advantage of color, time of blooming, and any other general information; Margie Wright—give us information on shrubs, something about their care and uses. For the next meeting also the members are supposed to have their first cards ready to sign, and also have their scrapbooks. At the close of the meeting the local leader gave all of the members some choice plants and cuttings of chrysanthemums, geraniums and roses. Gertrude Spore was a visitor at this meeting. The next meeting will be held at the school on Wednesday of this week.
