Annual Sale Of Poppies Set For Welfare Funds

Twelve million poppies to be worn on Poppy day, May 24, are being completed by disabled veterans working in government hospitals and American Legion auxiliary workrooms in every part of the nation, according to Mrs. I. H. Riegel, poppy chairman of the local auxiliary unit, and Mrs. C. E. Roselund, poppy poster chairman. The largest observance of Poppy day since the custom of wearing poppies in honor of the world war dead was established is expected this year. "The poppy has increased meaning to us this year," said Mrs. Riegel. "It reawakens memories of the sacrifices made in America's service in 1917 and 1918 and reminds us that freedom is ours only because Americans have been willing to give their lives for the nation. With new dangers facing our country, we need the inspiration of unselfish service which the poppy brings."

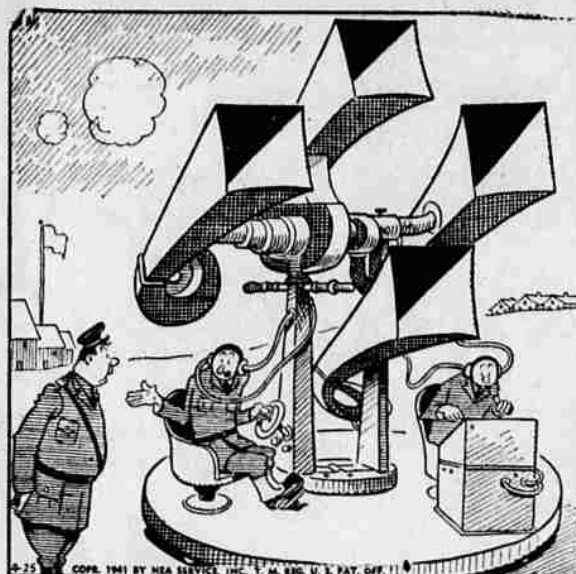
The memorial flowers which the local auxiliary women will distribute are being made at the veterans facility of Roseburg,

under the sponsorship of the Umpqua unit, No. 16, department of the auxiliary. Employment for many disabled veterans has been provided here by the poppy work, as at approximately 80 other manufacturing centers in all parts of the country. Every poppy offered by the auxiliary will be veteran-made and the earnings of the veterans will total \$120,000.

Members of the auxiliary here will form part of a poppy army of 100,000 women who will go into action on a nation-wide front the morning of May 24, distributing poppies on the streets of thousands of cities and towns. All will serve as unpaid volunteers, permitting every penny of the contributions made for the poppies to go into the welfare funds of the Legion and auxiliary. These funds work throughout the year, bringing relief and aid to disabled veterans and needy children of veterans. The bulk of the local contributions will remain in Roseburg to finance welfare activities here.

Charles Edward Russell, Famous Socialist, Dies

WASHINGTON, April 24.—(AP)—Charles Edward Russell, 80, writer and prominent socialist, died at his home here yesterday of heart disease.

Russell turned from a highly successful newspaper career in 1903 to join the "muckrakers," the coterie of journalists who for more than a decade exposed political, economic and social corruption wherever they could find it.

Russell's specialty was the corporations—as Lincoln Steffens specialized in municipal corruption and Ida Tarbell devoted her attention to the oil companies. The meat packers and the railroads were the targets of most of Russell's attacks.
