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Every state, county and city
official or board that handles
public money should publish at
regular intervals an accounting of
it, showing where and how
each dollar is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of demo-
cratic government.

Another Problem for the Council

SINCE the city council is giv-
ing consideration to the auto
parking problem in Roseburg, it
may as well do something about
another problem in connection
with city streets.

This other problem is really in
three parts:

(1) The names of streets, sten-
ciled in black on orange back-
grounds on curbs, are gener-
ally pretty thoroughly obliterated.
Nearly every one of them
should at least be repainted.

(2) The street names or designa-
tions in the northeast section
of the city are an utter abomina-
tion. Those streets should be re-
named—even at the cost of some
confusion resulting from both
old and new designations being
used for a time. Portland did
this job on a vast scale, with evi-
dent success.

(3) Houses are not properly
numbered in many instances.
Numbers should be checked and
altered to conform with the pre-
valent system of 100 numbers to
a city block.

This is a rather large order if
the suggested corrections are un-
dertaken all at one time. Some ex-
penditure of money would be in-
volved. However, it is necessary
that we bear in mind that there
is every indication that this city
will grow considerably during
the next few years. It is already
growing—with some industrial
development here it will grow at
a much faster rate. It will be
much easier to do the above
outlined job now than to wait
until further errors have been
made and existing ones multi-
plied.

The Evidence Is Plain

WHEN Sir Christopher Wren
had finished St. Paul's Cathed-
ral in London, they carved his
memorial on a marble plaque
and set it in the wall. "If you
wish to see his monument," they
wrote, "look about you."

Now that plaque lies beneath
the tumbled ruins of that grand
house of worship. The workers
who clear away the wreckage
will find the plaque, but the
wreckage itself is now a monu-
ment to another man whose tools
are not hammer and chisel, but
bomb and bullet.

sition to do anything about it.
Suez is the eastern entrance,
and already a German army is
pointed toward Suez along the
narrow coastal plain of north-
ern Africa. German diplomats
are dickering with Turkey, pre-
sumably to obtain a land route
for attacking Suez from the east.

THE British plainly anticipate
such a move, and are prepar-
ing for it.

A few days ago an inconspic-
uous dispatch told of the landing
of British forces at Basra, at
the head of the Persian gulf. If
you will study your map, you will
note that the Persian gulf leads
up from the Indian ocean to the
mouth of the valley of the Tig-
ris and the Euphrates. In this
area, your map will show you,
are great oil resources.

The Tigris and Euphrates valley
is a historic war route, and
the British are skilled in desert

fighting—in which the Germans
have had less experience. This
route leads up to Turkey and
Russia from the rear.

GERMAN newspapers today
(Tuesday) break into a rage
over the dastardly move on the
part of the British—calling it a
breach of international law, an
effort to drag more small na-
tions into the struggle, dirty pool,
etc. Germany's controlled press
is talking to Turkey and Russia,
trying to whip them into a rage
against the British.

The vehemence of this rage
is some measure of the import-
ance of the new British move
on the board.

THE British, one supposes, are
seeking not only to protect
the Near East oil but to open up
still another front that will
spread the German armies out
thinner. This front could be
supplied by their ships that are
shut out of the Mediterranean.

The Germans would have to
approach it either through Tur-
key or through French Syria
from the Mediterranean. Neither
route is well supplied with rail-
roads.

WITH the battle of the Balk-
ans lost, with the closing of
the Mediterranean to their fleet
not impossible (perhaps not im-
probable), the British are look-
ing forward to the opening up
of other battlefields.

That's war. As you lose one
position, you fall back to another.
It's the LAST BATTLE that
counts.

R. H. S. Indians Defeat Glide In Ball Game, 8 to 2

The Roseburg high school Indians, held to four hits by the combined hurling efforts of Fox and Dumont, Glide right-handers, capitalized on the wildness of Fox and the several errors made by Glide fielders to win 8 to 2 in a baseball game Wednesday afternoon on Finlay field.

The Indians will have another test of strength Friday when they meet Oakland high school at 4 p. m. on the Roseburg diamond. The game will give Legion Junior baseball fans an opportunity to see the material available from the Oakland team.

Yesterday's game resulted in considerable excitement and good plays.

Eugene Fox, Glide's lanky hurler, who has a most unorthodox pitching style but dishes up a tantalizing curve ball, pitched the first four innings of yesterday's game. He allowed only two hits, which were garnered by Wimberly and Sansted, and struck out eight batters. However, he was lacking in control and issued eight walks, which, coupled with the two hits and several errors resulted in three runs. Roseburg added three more in the 4th inning on two errors, a passed ball, one hit and two stolen bases. Dumont hurled the last two frames for Glide, allowing two hits, which resulted in one run, and gathering four strikeouts.

It was learned yesterday that Fox, who had been expected to be available for Legion baseball, is six months over the age limitation and therefore will not be eligible.

Dick Debernardi, the Roseburg hurler, who has shown marked improvement in each game, had to strikeouts and issued no passes.

Seven hits were chalked up against him, but several of these were of the scratch variety. One ball took a bad hop. Another was lost by an outfielder who stumbled in tall grass. Debernardi lost one himself, when he got out of position in fielding a bunt.

Ace Pitchers In Majors Begin To Turn in Victories

The big trains are getting the right of way now on baseball's main line after a little more than a week of confusion.

The world champion Cincinnati Reds, with the best pitching staff in the major leagues, have just won two shutouts from the Chicago Cubs.

The St. Louis Cardinals and Brooklyn Dodgers are making their moves at the same time.

The Cleveland Indians have squeezed into a tie for the American league lead. The New York Yankees are climbing up and the Boston Red Sox are sliding down. Thus without any particular fanfare the races in the two big leagues are settling down for their long summer's grind in just about the fashion everyone expected.

Walters pitched the Reds to their fourth straight triumph yesterday with a five-hit 5-0 conquest of the Cubs. The day before Vandermeer clipped the same club 1-0 on four hits. Thus the Reds are rolling true to form and haven't even tapped Monte Pearson, their pitching pickup from the Yankees.

Giants Faltering.

The New York Giants still are setting the pace in the National league, but with a faltering gait that may give way at any moment. They edged out the Boston Bees 5-4 yesterday by means of a four-run rally in the sixth inning. However, the tip-off is that they have used 23 pitchers in nine games.

The Brooklyn Dodgers plastered a 4-0 shutout on the Phillies with Wyatt scattering four hits. In his last previous start he had held the Bees to three safeties and apparently he is sighted for a big season. The Dodgers suffered a handicap when Reiser was hit on the right cheek by a ball pitched by Ike Pearson, but x-rays showed no bones were broken and he may be back in the lineup by the time the club has to defend itself against the western invasion next week.

The St. Louis Cardinals penned the Pittsburgh Pirates again 3-1 on the three-hit pitching of Nahem, who was the "sleeper" in last year's trade that sent Medwick to the Dodgers. The only run against the young lawyer was unearned, coming on two errors in the eighth inning after the Cards had completed their scoring.

Cleveland cooked up a four-run inning to help Feller get a 5-2 decision over the St. Louis Browns, who evidently don't have any "pitch stealers." The fireballer kept eight hits spaced, fanned eight and walked seven.

Homer Wins for Yanks.

At the same time the Yankees handed the Red Sox their third straight defeat 4-2 on Rizzuto's homer with one on in the 11th inning. Up until then the game was a tight hurling duel between Gomez, the old lefthander, and Wagner, Boston rookie.

Newhouse, who kept the Detroit Tigers in striking position through the early months of last summer, pitched eight-hit ball while his teammates found their batting eye and crushed the Chicago White Sox 13-5.

The Philadelphia Athletics crammed nine runs into one inning for an 11-7 triumph over the Washington Senators, who made a dozen hits themselves but committed five errors. The A's 15th offensive included two homers by Catcher Hayes, one with the bases loaded.

Padres Displace Seattle in Second Place in League

Suffering their second straight setback at the hands of the Pacific Coast league leading Sacramento Solons last night, the Seattle Rainiers dove into third place when the San Diego Padres handed Portland another defeat.

Four-run barrages in the first and eighth innings and a three-run outburst in the ninth were highlights of Sacramento's 13-2 triumph over the champions, the worst rout Seattle has suffered this season.

Doubles by Haslin and Sperry, coming in the seventh, produced the odd run in the Padres' 3-2 victory over Portland.

Hebert, Padres lefthander, and Liska both went the route, the Portland hurler being nicked for ten hits to eight for Hebert.

Stepping to the plate as a pinch hitter with two out in the last of the ninth and the bases loaded, Babe Herman hit a homer to give Hollywood a 10-6 victory over Los Angeles. The defeat dropped the Angels into seventh place.

The San Francisco Seals moved up to a fifth-place tie with Oakland by scoring a 4-3 decision over their cross-bay rivals.
