

Deserted Bride Accuses Ex Cop of Money Theft

SEATTLE, April 24.—(AP)—Frank Clear, 46-year-old former Reno, Nev., policeman, was released from jail in \$3,000 bond today on a grand larceny complaint brought by his bride of three months, who accused him of taking \$1,425 of her money when he left her March 25.

Clear, a meat cutter, was returned here from Los Angeles yesterday after unsuccessfully attempting to fight extradition from California.

In addition to the specific sum named in the complaint, the bride, Mrs. Cecelia Curlee Clear, declared her husband also obtained some \$8,000 of her money prior to and after their marriage at Yuma, Ariz., last February 15, Chief Criminal Deputy Prosecutor John M. Schermer said. Mrs. Clear now lives here.

British Fleeing Greece Under Hail of Air Bombs

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armies in the northwest after they had been cut off by German panzer columns, summed up that debacle in seven words:

"These forces did not possess anti-tank guns."

DNE, German official news agency, said that in the drive through Thessaly on southern Greece the nazis captured several thousand British soldiers at one camp along with "hundreds of tanks and trucks, munitions, provisions and several three-inch guns."

Italian Losses Listed.

Premier Mussolini's high command listed 6,000 Italian troops killed or wounded, including 400 officers, in the final offensive against the Greeks on the Albanian front.

Hostilities ceased at 6 p. m. last night under the terms of an armistice signed at the Salonika headquarters of German Field Marshal List, commander of the nazis, Rome reported.

Even though reports in London said the pace of the motorized nazis drive had slackened, Britain waited impatiently and in an increasingly critical mood for word of the Greek finale and was prepared to hear the worst.

Already lost were all of northern Greece and Greece's northwestern army of about 250,000 men which had accepted unconditional surrender under the combined might of Germany and Italy.

Mussolini, in an order of the day, expressed Italy's pride in victory over Greeks, declaring the Italian troops had illuminated their flags "with new glory."

Turkey's Action Awaited.

The Bosphorus and Dardanelles—vital straight between the Black and Mediterranean seas—loomed possible as the next axis objective.

In London, the laborite Daily Herald quoted foreign diplomatic circles as saying Germany had demanded that Turkey exchange military control of the straits for a slice of Greek Thrace and was pressing the Ankara government for a quick reply.

Some observers connected this with the reported nazis occupation of the Greek islands of Lemnos and Samothrace, and, in Istanbul, diplomatic circles yesterday said they expected German Ambassador Von Papen would bring "some proposal" when he returns to Turkey from Berlin.

These sources said they believed Turkey would turn thumbs down on any request for passage of German troops through Turkish territory but might agree to close the Dardanelles to foreign warships.

Axis Attacks Tobruk.

German and Italian air units made two bombing attacks on British-held Tobruk, Libya, yesterday, sinking one ship in the harbor and damaging two vessels, informed Germans said today.

In the second raid, it was said "all shipping space still afloat in the harbor" was damaged.

At Sydney, Australia, the advisory war council, apparently spurred by military reverses in the middle east and the Balkans, discussed ways and means of speeding up Australia's output of munitions and mechanical war equipment.

DEFENSE BOARD TACKLES SOFT COAL PROBLEM

24-day-old wage dispute to the board after southern operators withdrew from conferences with CIO United Mine Workers in New York last night. The southern producers declared the negotiations were "hopelessly deadlocked."

Other important labor developments included:

Ten thousand Southern Railway shopmen were reported by the Knoxville Journal to have voted to extend their work week from 40 to 48 hours, at the present wage scale, to "fill the gap in ranks of skilled labor caused by the national defense program."

Governor Van Wagoner of Michigan named a special commission to mediate a contract dispute between the CIO United Automobile Workers and General Motors corporation.

The Cudahy, Swift, and Wilson Pack companies announced 8 per cent wage increases for more than 31,000 production and maintenance workers in Chicago.

The soft coal dispute affects some 400,000 miners and 7,000 producers in the eight-state Appalachian area and in outlying districts where wage scales customarily follow the Appalachian contract.

COLUMBIA SAWMILL AREA UNIONS VOTE FOR STRIKE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24.—(AP)—A strike call was authorized yesterday by the Columbia logging camp workers unions if river district CIO sawmill and negotiations for wage increases and other concessions fail.

Approximately 78.4 per cent of the 70 per cent of 9000 workers affected voted for the strike call, Al Hartung, president of the International Woodworkers of America district council, said in announcing the vote.

Negotiating committees were instructed first to resume negotiations with employers, then seek arbitration, leaving a strike as the last resort.

The workers ask wage increases of 15 cents an hour and other concessions. Operators refused to consider the wage demands on the ground that they were twice those sought by the IWA in Washington.

They indicated they would be willing to consider smaller boosts.

SACRAMENTO, April 24.—(AP)—A six-day strike of Sacramento box makers ended today when 165 men returned to work in three plants.

Big German Battleships Crippled, British Claim

The Dutch island of Tereschelling, machine-gunned nazis troops, hit several ships with the probable destruction of three and returned to the assault last night in a "determined attack" on the German battleships Gneisenau and Scharnhorst at Brest, France.

Many bombs were dropped on the French base, the communiqué said, and added that in this latest of many attacks there one large fire and several small ones were observed.

Le Havre likewise was subjected to a night assault and the air ministry said there too many fires were started.

The British said one plane was lost in yesterday's operations, none last night.

Plymouth Again Suffers

The Germans came over the channel for daylight raids on England today after striking Plymouth heavily for the third successive night.

Two Luftwaffe bombers were destroyed over Plymouth and two more nazis craft were downed today, the air ministry announced, one over the channel and the other over the Sussex coast.

In Plymouth, which lies across-channel from Brest, the nazis bombs churned anew the wreckage left by the previous raids, and caused at least 12 deaths. Two raiding bombers were reported shot down.

Destroyed buildings at Plymouth included the market, four churches, a hospital and blocks of office and house property. Five firemen were killed when a building collapsed.

An authoritative source emphasized that Britain still has adequate western port facilities to receive war materials from the United States, despite Germany's systematic assault on those ports in the last six months.

Since Plymouth is only one of Britain's small commercial ports, it was regarded doubtful that the Germans were trying primarily to block the entry of American shipments there when they attacked it the last three nights.
