Mrs. Roosevelt Dated for Lecture At U. of Oregon



Mrs. F. D. Roosevelt
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON,
Eugene, April 23.—(Special)—
America's "first lady," Mrs.
Franklin D. Roosevelt, will pre-
sent her first lecture in Oregon
at McArthur court, Eugene, Wed-
nesday evening, April 24, at 8 o'-
clock, under the auspices of the
educational activities board of the
University of Oregon. Her sub-
ject will be "The Cultural Rela-
tionship Between the American
Republics."

Mrs. Roosevelt is acknowledged
to be one of the best informed
women in the nation on condi-
tions throughout the United
States, having for many years
played an important part in the
educational and sociological af-
fairs of the day.

As a lecturer, Mrs. Roosevelt
is a model of punctuality. She
fills as many as six engagements
a week and as yet has never been
late or missed a train. Nor is she
impatient with questions from
her audience so long as they
evidence a desire for information
of opinions.

Barracks Explosion at Horta Kills 13 Persons

HORTA, The Azores, April 24.
—(AP)—Twelve soldiers and a
civilian were killed and nine sol-
diers were injured by a muni-
tions explosion which destroyed
a barracks Tuesday at this mid-
Atlantic Portuguese stopping
place for trans-Atlantic air lin-
ers.

The blast occurred only 10
minutes after most of the garri-
son had departed for morning
drill. Considerable military
equipment was destroyed, a
church entrance was demolished
and windows were shattered over
a wide area.

Military authorities suggested
the explosion might have result-
ed from spontaneous combustion
in black powder used in saluting

shells.
The Pan American airways
base was undamaged.
