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communicate said. While conceding another major setback, London officials insisted the climax of the 20-day-old battle of the Balkans was less serious than the episode at Dunkerque, in the allied escape from the bloody fields of Flanders last spring.

The number of troops and the quantity of material endangered by the German drive in France was far greater, the British said. German forces, carried by plane-escorted troop ships, landed yesterday on the Greek island of Lemnos, 40 miles from the strategic Dardanelles, and subdued a small Greek force after a four-hour battle.

The Greek minister of home security disclosed indirectly that the Germans also were on the neighboring island of Samothrace.

It was unofficially reported today that the Turkish government

has decided to inspect German ships passing from the Black sea through the Dardanelles to determine whether they are carrying war materials or troops.

A Reuters news agency dispatch from Cairo said today that Yugoslav troops and planes had reached the middle east to join British forces in the fight against the Germans. The Yugoslavs received a warm welcome from the population and from empire troops, the report said.

A communique from Cairo, also reported that the Tobruk garrison, in Libya, had beaten off an axis attack on its defenses and captured 127 Italians and Germans.

Heavy losses also were declared inflicted on the Germans and Italians at Tobruk, and it was said British patrols again had been aggressive at Salum, just over the border in Egypt.

"Our forward move" is continuing in Ethiopia in the direction of Dessie, northeast of Addis Ababa, the communique said.

More than 700 prisoners were taken in operations yesterday in that sector in which the Italians were said to have suffered severe casualties.

Man Taken to Gardiner On Charge of Larceny

Arnold R. Stevenson, 30, was taken to Gardiner today by Sheriff Cliff Thornton to answer a charge of larceny by bailor. Stevenson was arrested Thursday in Portland on a warrant issued from the Gardiner justice court and was brought to Roseburg last night by Deputy Sheriff O. T. Carter.

Sheriff Thornton also took Ralph Edward Crump to Reedsport, to be delivered there to state police. Crump has just completed a 25-day term in the Douglas county jail after being sentenced on a charge of petit larceny. He is wanted in Coos county on similar charges, the sheriff said he was informed.

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on such places as Bermuda, Newfoundland, Greenland, or Trinidad.

Since then, he continued, events have shown an attack is more possible today than it was then. Furthermore, the president said, the United States has valuable American lives and property located where it did not have them in 1939.

He spoke of Greenland, Newfoundland, Bermuda, of Canada which the United States has obligation under the Monroe doctrine to protect against any non-American nation, and of the Bahamas, Antigua and others of the British West Indies, and British Guiana, where this country also has established bases.

(Greenland has been formally embraced within the hemisphere defense system.)

Direct Question Dodged The president was told that three of his cabinet officers seemed to be concerned over aid to Britain, and he was asked how this tied in with his own remarks. He said he did not know. And he dodged a question whether the country had anything better in mind, than a convoy system, to insure delivery of war supplies to Britain.

The concerted demand by three cabinet members for decisive action in the present war crisis was generally interpreted here as a pointed warning that a development of top magnitude was near.

Secretary of State Hull, Secretary of Navy Knox and Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, addressing widely different audiences yesterday, all spoke out in unusually strong language.

"The safety of this hemisphere and of this country," asserted Hull, "calls for resistance wherever resistance will be most effective." To wait for actual invasion would be "utterly short-sighted and extremely dangerous."

The declared policy of the nation, he added, meant that aid to Britain "must reach its destination in the shortest time and in the maximum quantity."

"So—ways must be found to do Knox struck an identical note.

"Our Fight," Knox Says "We cannot allow our goods to be sunk in the Atlantic," he said, "we shall be beaten if they do. We must see the job through. This is our fight."

Wickard's theme was that if the United States is "to continue as a great nation, it must act like a great nation." He summarized the chronicle of the war as a "story of 'too little and too late.'"

"Millions of Americans," he declared, "are getting sick of that story."

Just what type of action might be presaged by the three addresses was a matter of conjecture, with considerable attention paid to the fact that both Hull and Knox laid heavy emphasis on the necessity of seeing that lease-lend supplies got to England safely.

Naval Patrol Foreseen Some capital sources deduced that plans were in readiness to utilize ships of the United States navy to protect shipping lanes, at least in that half of the Atlantic which the administration considers in the western hemisphere. Some saw hints of a formal reassertion of America's historic insistence on "freedom of the seas" the issue in the war of 1812 and again in 1917.

One opinion heard was that if

a major decision did materialize, it probably would have dramatic timing, a psychological impact and perhaps an element of the unexpected. The unheralded announcement of the transfer of destroyers to Britain, and President Roosevelt's first proposal of the lease-lend program were cited as precedents for such an expectation.

Hull Voices Warning Hull's speech was regarded by several persons close to the state department as the strongest he has made as secretary.

He called off the names of the 15 European nations that "have lost everything that makes life worth living," and commented: "It is high time that the remaining free countries should arm to the fullest extent and in the briefest time humanly possible, and act for their self-preservation."

balloting on a strike call against General Motor corporation's 61 widely scattered production units.

Housing Strike Settled Government-authorized wage increases went to some 3,000 building craftsmen at San Diego, Calif., today, ending a brief and partial interruption in the navy's defense housing program here.

K. G. Bitter, secretary of the San Diego district AFL building trades council, said the council had accepted an offer for a 10 per cent pay boost for electricians, painters, roofers and floor-layers on the understanding it would be effective immediately.

Still at issue was the unions' request that the raises be made retroactive to Jan. 1, when other construction workers engaged on defense projects received similar increases, but Bitter indicated that, for the time being at least, strike action would not be invoked to enforce this demand.

The navy department, which will pay the bill, acceded to the wage demands late yesterday after an eight-hour walkout by 1,800 building tradesmen had suspended work on two 600-unit naval housing developments.

Lumber Wages Hoisted Twenty-five thousand Washington and Oregon lumber workers were assured a 75 cents an hour minimum wage today as result of an agreement between the AFL lumber and sawmill workers union and Pacific northwest lumber companies.

Week long negotiations for a wage contract ended in a compromise last night when confer-

ees agreed on an hourly wage increase of 7 1/2 cents. Union leaders had demanded a 10 cent increase and the operators had offered 5 cents.

The agreement, effective May 1 and extending until August 31 of this year, also provides that the union and employers shall within 30 days select a joint industry wage board with power to raise or lower wage standards on the basis of changing conditions. The board will consist of four union members, four employers' representatives and "such technical experts as may be deemed necessary."

The pact provides that board will be limited in authority to lower wages by the standards prevailing in the industry as of last September.
