Opening National Music week in Roseburg will be a very charming concert by Attorney H. A. Canada's orchestra to be held Monday evening, May 5. Details of the concert will be published at a later date.

The music week this year is the inauguration of the Inter-American Music week, which has as its aim the promotion of friendly and cultural ties among the countries of the western hemisphere.

A letter from President Roosevelt to the National Music week secretary is as follows:

"I have followed with interest and real appreciation the work carried on by your National Music week program. It has done a great deal to encourage and stimulate an ever increasing enjoyment and understanding of music throughout the country."

"The decision of your committee to set aside one day of National Music week as Inter-American Music day is indeed gratifying to those of us who have been so keenly interested in bringing about a deeper understanding between the people of the Americas. I believe that Inter-American Music day will make a real contribution toward this and encourage the study of the hemisphere's rich and varied cultural heritage in the field of music. In so doing you are serving the cause and ideals of democracy throughout the Americas in these critical times."
