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Real Co-operation Begins

EVERYWHERE you look today you see signs that people are beginning to take the defense emergency seriously.

The entire motor industry has willingly accepted an initial 20 per cent reduction in production of motor vehicles for the model year which begins August 1.

All manufacturers of brass pipe are discontinuing production of yellow brass pipe, and are making red brass pipe instead.

This sort of thing is going on all through industry in an increasing wave. And in the meantime, labor, too, seems to be settling down.

As the German legions pound southward in the last act of the Greek tragedy, and as the Japanese invaders draw tighter the stranghold they have on China, more Americans every day begin to think what ultimate success of these adventures means to them.

Both have given ample proof that their aims go far beyond readjustment of local boundaries.

They have made the world a place in which only the strong can hope to preserve their rights, their living space, their way of life.

Industry, labor, soldier and sailor, man and woman, America is beginning to fall into step in a marching cadence which means strength, the only safety for the future.

Civilian Defense Organized

THERE are many phases of all-out defense beyond the purely military steps needed. Today's wars are wars against civilian as well as soldier, and the civilian must be no less prepared.

The United States has been studying the lessons of Europe—how London, ill-prepared for defense, was the more ready to knuckle under at Munich; how Rotterdam and Belgrade paid dearly for their lack of civilian protection measures.

MARK these words that have come down to us through 2400 years: "You have perfected your weapons and your discipline."

Because they failed to heed this lesson of history, the democracies are now in distress.

The Chicago White Sox shaded the St. Louis Browns 7-6 by getting 15 hits to the Browns' 12. Dietrich survived the full nine innings for his third straight win.

The Cardinals nailed down their fifth triumph in six starts Sunday with an 8-5 conquest of the Chicago Cubs. The St. Louis sluggers pounded four Chicago chucks for 13 hits.

This success was enough to lift the Cardinals into first place yesterday, but the squeeze is so tight that Brooklyn can move into the lead if it wins today while the Redbirds are traveling.

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Sacs Boost League Lead; Beavers Win San Diego Series

(By the Associated Press)

Lopsided series results sharply altered the complexion of the Pacific coast baseball league race today.

Each loser of six games out of seven, Seattle dropped within the space of a week from second place to fourth, Oakland from fifth to seventh and Los Angeles from sixth to last.

Corresponding gains were made by Hollywood and San Francisco, and even by Portland, although the Beavers, in achieving against San Diego one of their recently rare series victories, captured only the odd game.

Sacramento, league leader at the start of last week by a moderately comfortable margin, moved practically out of the sight of even its closest pursuers.

Three week-end victories culminated Sacramento's rout of Seattle. Starting with Saturday's 2-0 shutout by Freitas, they pinned a pair of 8-7 and 8-3 decisions on the staggering Rainiers yesterday.

Doubleheader success against San Diego yesterday, 5-0 and 6-3, clinched the series for the Portland Beavers, whose four victories in a week doubled their total for the year to date and lifted them from eighth place to sixth.

Submariner Liska was responsible for the shutout, in which only rival Pitcher Hebert and Outfielder Mazera, each with a pair of hits, were able to touch his offerings.

San Diego, which remained in second place although forced to share the spot with Hollywood, won Saturday's game, 11-9, on three runs in the last inning.

Two reasonably tight Sunday games, 5-2 and 3-2, followed a 6-4 Saturday decision to give Hollywood a week-end sweep over Los Angeles.

San Francisco breezed past Oakland and into fifth place on yesterday's 6-1 and 6-3 double victory.
