

Leo Turner Headlined on Roseburg Boxing Card

Regional Champ Fights Jack Hogue Here on May 9

Babe Fenton Probably to Meet Young Nationalista in 2nd Spot on Seasonal Opener

Leo "The Lion" Turner, Oregon state and northwest middleweight champion, a great favorite with local boxing fans, will headline the main event of the first American Legion sponsored fight card of 1941 in Roseburg, Rudy Ritzman, matchmaker, announced today. The fight card is to be held at the Roseburg armory, Friday, May 9. It will be the first of a series of sufficient interest is shown to justify continuance, Ritzman reports.

Turner, the colored middleweight who has pleased Roseburg crowds on numerous occasions, will battle Sailor Jack Hogue of San Diego. Hogue recently came to the Pacific northwest with a brother, who has been headlined at Seattle. He has met and defeated some of the best middleweights of the district and already is in line for a title bout with Turner. The Portland colored boy is greatly improved and is a much faster and harder puncher than when last seen in Roseburg, Ritzman reports.

For the second spot on the card, Ritzman is planning a battle between Young Nationalista of Portland, speedy Filipino, and Babe Fenton of Sutherlin. Nationalista holds a knockout over Fenton, who has been endeavoring to get a return bout. The Sutherlin boy now is in hard training after being beaten a week ago because he had failed to get himself into condition.

Local fans are assured plenty of action in the card scheduled for May 9, according to Ritzman, who reports he expects to have the preliminaries arranged within the next few days.

R. H. S., Yoncalla May Be Billed In Baseball Game

Coach "Hod" Turner announced today that efforts are being made to schedule a Memorial day baseball game between the Roseburg Indians and the Yoncalla Eagles. The game, as planned, would be played on Finlay field on the afternoon of May 30. The game would be of particular interest to local fans, as the Yoncalla team is coached by Howard Parks, who will handle the Legion Junior baseball activity at Roseburg during the summer months.

The Yoncalla Eagles have the strongest team in the history of their school, with three fine pitchers, all eligible for American Legion ball.

Glenn Cox, pitcher and ace slugger of the Yoncalla team, is well known to the local fans, having played with the Douglas county squad last year. He was one of the leading hitters of the team. He has greatly improved in pitching ability and has won three games and lost one—a one run defeat at the hands of Cottage Grove—so far this season.

Earl Howard, six feet three inches, 185-pound right hander, is a newcomer to the Yoncalla team, having played formerly with the Legion Juniors at Toledo. He has had three years of pitching experience.

Norman Main, who plays third base on the Yoncalla team, also is a "chucker" and has a steaming fast ball, which makes him valuable particularly in a relief role to follow one of the curve ball pitchers. Among other players on the Yoncalla team eligible for Junior ball are Wayne Rice, shortstop and outfielder who has played Legion ball for two years; Don Bigelow, Jim Madden and Willard Williams, a trio of freshman ballplayers.

Roseburg, of course, has seven of their first team players eligible, together with Ward Cummings, who is on the tennis team and, therefore, not turning out for baseball, and Jack Loomis, who is in the 8th grade and not eligible for high school ball.

Sizing up the rest of the material around the county, there appears to be a wealth of fine ball players to indicate that Douglas county this year will have the strongest Legion team in history. Among the outstanding candidates are Nelson Rust, Myrtle Creek, a fine shortstop; Ed Sellers, pitcher, from the same club, and Chaney, the Viking first baseman. Oakland has five eligible players: Stephens, a veteran from last year who plays any spot on the infield; Settle, a fine catching prospect, and three other promising lads, Drain, Elktion and Glide, also have at least one or two players who doubtless will be in the race for positions.

The Indians will play their last regularly scheduled game of the season Friday afternoon when they meet Myrtle Creek on Finlay field. Myrtle Creek has been improving rapidly, and the local team is anticipating a real battle. This game will close the regular season, but post season games, including the proposed Memorial day contest, may be scheduled.

Brooklyn Climbs To Lead by Win Over Cincinnati

The Cincinnati Reds, last year world champions, yesterday bumped into the Brooklyn Dodgers, one of the National league's improved clubs, and the Dodgers emerged with their seventh successive victory, 3-2, and took over first place in the senior circuit, while the Reds were left languishing in fourth place.

The Reds had good pitching—a six-hit job by their veteran ace, Derringer. They had their customary flawless fielding—including one of the most spectacular catches of the young season when Ival Goodman stood almost against the rightfield fence, 300 feet from the plate, and jumped high to spear a liner in the sixth inning. They had as good an offense as the Dodgers—six hits, including a home run by McCormick.

But the Dodgers had that "zing" that challenges sometimes get and champions eventually lose.

Wyatt, near 31 years of age, struck out ten of the champs and held them to six hits, too. When McCormick's homer put the Reds in front, the Dodgers had what it took to get back in front—a single by Wasdell and a home run by Kampouris. When the Reds tied the score through Lombardi's triple in the seventh, the Dodgers had what was needed to win in the ninth—a single with two on by Wyatt himself. This was the only league game.

Indians Drub Tigers
The Cleveland Indians reinforced their grip on first place by drubbing the Detroit Tigers, 7-2. The Chicago White Sox moved into a third-place tie with a 2-1 edge over the St. Louis Browns.

The contest at Cleveland started out as a hurling duel between Milnar and Newhouse.

Newhouse struck out nine men and allowed only four hits in six innings, but he was wild. The White Sox beat the Browns simply because they put their eight hits closer together than St. Louis did its 11. Rookie Jack Hallett, a 6-foot 4-inch right-hander who was with Shreveport last season, survived the full nine innings for the victory.

Spring CCC Set-Up for Oregon Is Outlined

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—The civilian conservation corps began the final quarter of

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the current fiscal year, April 1-June 30, with 56 camps assigned for operation in Oregon.

James J. McEntee, corps director, said about 11,200 CCC men would work on conservation projects in the state, 3400 on national forest projects, 400 in state forests, 1200 on private forest area, 800 on erosion control, 400 at the Malheur migratory bird refuge, 200 at the Hart mountain antelope refuge, 1800 on range rehabilitation, 1200 on federal reclamation, 1000 on the public do-

main on projects under technical supervision of the land office, 400 in state parks, and 400 in Crater lake national park.

The spring operating program calls for the opening of one new camp, the reestablishment of nine camps, seven of which are at previously occupied summer work locations, and the closing of 13 camps.

ABSTRACT OF STATEMENT BY NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL (Issued January 28, 1941)

The National Research Council's Committee on Food and Nutrition announces that it has urged the millers and bakers of the nation to start immediate production of a new flour and bread enriched in vitamins and minerals.

The new bread will be called "enriched". It will contain thiamin (Vitamin B₁), iron, and pellagra-preventing factor and bread enriched in vitamins and minerals.

The need for early action in production of "enriched flour" and "enriched bread" is emphasized by the defense emergency ... Unquestionably, millions of Americans are not eating diets adequate in all essentials. The general use of "enriched" flour and bread will materially improve the diet of the American people in this respect.

The committee ... urges consumers to purchase "enriched flour" and "enriched bread" in preference to types of flour and bread which fail to provide the specific amounts of the nutritional factors named.



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
