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the RAF was proof enough that there had been more.

The likely thing for the Germans to do, he asserted, would be to move the two powerful surface raiders the minute the British showed they knew where the ships were. He recalled that the German cruiser Hipper "disappeared" from Brest after she was bombed a second time by the RAF on March 2.

Several air ministry communiqués have claimed that British bombs straddled the warships, one of which is in drydock and the other tied up beside a wharf.

Military quarters reckoned that a nearby hit on a dock would be almost as effective as a direct hit. Or a hit on a barracks, it was argued, might wipe out essential crewmen.

Luftwaffe raids on Malta last night, Berlin asserted, resulted in a direct hit amidships on a British cruiser of the Southampton class with a heavy caliber bomb. A merchant ship and an oil depot were reported set afire.

Plymouth was singled out for last night's major attack against England, and numerous fires and considerable destruction was claimed by Berlin. The harbor area of Great Yarmouth, a factory on the Scottish east coast, coal docks, railroads and troop camps in the Peterhead region were targets in other night assaults.

At one raided airport in south-west England, the Berlin command said, bombs burst among parked planes and hangars, and munition dumps went up in flames.

Two merchant ships were sunk, the high command said, by air bombs east of Dundee, Scotland, and southeast of Lowestoft.

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the Germans could leap-frog past the Dardanelles, which the Turks have declared was guarded by a million bayonets.

Fighting continued only on the Peloponnese in the south of Greece, sketchy reports indicating the Germans were still pursuing the last of the B. E. F. as it fell back toward "escape" ports.

In north Africa, Premier Mussolini's high command reported, German and Italian scouting troops inflicted heavy losses on the British in fighting around Salum, just inside the Egyptian frontier from Libya.

London reports countered with the assertion that the axis vanguard, driving toward the Suez canal, had been held in check by the harassing action of British patrols five or six miles east of Salum.

Australian troops at the siege-sit Libya port of Tobruk were said to have made new sallies against axis forces in that sector, 80 miles west of the Egyptian border.

From the Ethiopian front, the British reported capture of 2,000 Italians and 400 colonial soldiers "with a number of guns and quantities of war materials" in connection with the seizure Sunday of Dessie.

Guessing on Hitler

That the war was back on a "nerves" basis was indicated by widespread guessing about Hitler's next immediate move.

Canadian Prime Minister Mackenzie King, speaking to the house of commons in Ottawa yesterday, named points from Singapore to Gibraltar as possible German objectives. Some circles in Washington were inclined to agree with British Prime Minister Churchill that no matter what the Germans do elsewhere, they must win in the Atlantic to defeat England.

Reuters, British news agency, announced today it had picked up a German radio report that 31 Britons had been arrested at Val-

As one operator explained it, the commerce chief told the southern producers bluntly that "something has to be done and done quickly."

LOGGING STRIKE THREAT IN COLUMBIA AREA GROWS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—(AP)—CIO International Woodworkers of America and employers of the Columbia river logging area met today in another effort to prevent a strike of the 9000 CIO employees in the district.

Threat of a walkout increased last night with announcement by Frank Gordon, district union secretary, that an employer's offer of a 71-cent-an-hour wage increase was "not at all satisfactory."

Unionists have demanded a 15-cent increase, and Gordon warned a settlement must be reached soon or a strike would be called. Authority for the strike already has been voted to officials.

SILVERTON, April 29.—(AP)—A 5-cent-an-hour wage increase was offered industrial employees union, local No. 50, last night by the Silver Falls Timber company. The union had asked a 10-cent increase. Officials said they would recommend that the company offer be rejected at a May 6 union meeting, and that negotiations continue.
