

### U. S. Patrols 2,000 Miles Out Now

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—Admiral Harold R. Stark disclosed today that American neutrality patrols were operating at some points as much as 2,000 miles from shore.

In an extemporaneous addition to his prepared address, Stark said that generally patrol vessels were operating about half way across the Atlantic "from the high latitudes to the Antarctic in both oceans."

Indirectly he linked patrols with the problem of conveying ships to Britain but in such a manner as not to indicate what connection he saw between them.

Senator Nye (R., N. D.) formally introduced today his resolution to require congressional approval before the president could order convoys. The resolution provided that unless congress approved the use of convoys within 14 days after the president requested them they could not be employed.

Stark also said that naval construction was running ahead of schedule and that the United States would share its resources to the limits of its security.

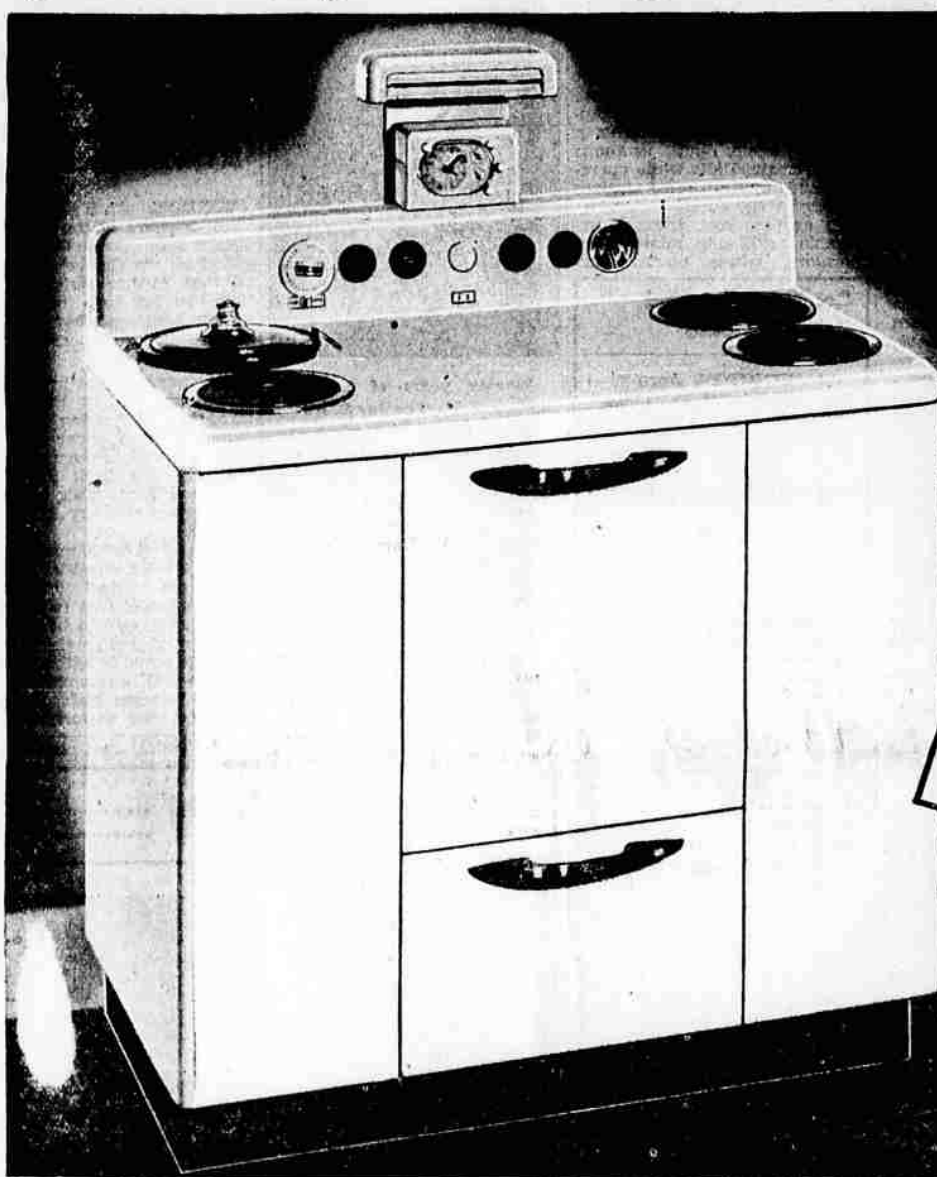
