Springfield with a squad of 36 men, four times larger than Roseburg's, took first place with 803 points. Roseburg had 30 points, University high of Eugene 273 points and Junction City 15 points.

Brooklyn Again Beats Cincinnati; Cards Beat Giants

Luke Hamlin of the Brooklyn Dodgers yesterday fed two more home run balls in one game to the world champion Cincinnati Reds, off to Lonnie Frey in the first inning and the other by McCormick in the last frame, but they were nothing more than marks of identification to prove that it was Hamlin out there doing a superb job of hurling his third straight victory.

In between the widely-separated swats he allowed only two harmless singles, and the Dodgers whooped their way to their way to their eighth consecutive triumph, 13-2.

The victory, second in a four-game series, enabled the Dodgers to hold a half share in first place in the National league. The St. Louis Cardinals, who opened their eastern invasion by nudging out the New York Giants, 5-4, came out with the same percentage, because they have played fewer games.

The Boston Bees, experts at prolonging games into extra in-

nings, conquered the Chicago Cubs, 6-3, when Sisti socked a homer in the 11th with two teammates aboard.

Rookie Bill Crouch, who was one of the anchors attached to the bundle of cash Brooklyn gave Philadelphia for Kirby Higbe, pitched four-hit ball as the Phils plastered the Pittsburgh Pirates 6-2.

The Cleveland Indians maintained their firm hold on the American league lead with their fifth straight victory. They made 15 hits, five more than they had accomplished in any other game this season, to swamp the Philadelphia Athletics, 8-3.

More interest, however, was attached to the St. Louis Browns' bending of the New York Yankees, 3-2, in spite of the three-hit pitching of Gomez, who previously had won twice without a defeat. Gomez gave eight walks, forcing in one run with four in the first inning, and in the eighth inning was tabbed for a home run by Laabs to decide the game. Gomez was opposed by Bob Harris, who scattered five hits and had a shutout until Dickey doubled behind a walk and an error for both New York runs in the seventh.

The defeat dropped the Yanks into third place as the Chicago White Sox curbed the Washington Senators, 3-2, on the seventh-hit pitching of Thornton Lee.

Kuhel drove in two of the winners' runs with a homer and a single.

The Detroit Tigers shattered the 15-year-old jinx of Lefty Grove to beat the Boston Red Sox, 5-3, scoring all their runs off the veteran southpaw star in the first three innings. Gorsica hurled eight-hit ball for the Tigers and survived late-inning homers by Williams and Jim Tabor.

Babe Fenton Beats Young Nationalists But Breaks Thumb

Babe Fenton, well known Sutherland boxer, today claimed the lightweight championship of Oregon as the result of a four-round decision over Young Nationalista, Filipino fighter, at Salem last night. Incidentally, Fenton, who was scheduled to meet Nationalista on a card at Roseburg May 9, probably will not be able to fight here, as he broke his right thumb in the third round of last night's engagement, when he swung a hard punch and floor-

Fenton's victory last night wipes out a defeat he suffered at the hands of the Filipino more than a year ago in a bout at Port-

land. He is now gunning for a return match with Swede Bergstrom of Seattle, who knocked Fenton out recently in a match on a Seattle card.

Fenton, who has been engaged in piling work at Sutherland, took the fight with Bergstrom on short notice and was not in proper condition. He has been beaten by body punches. He has since been putting in a lot of time getting in condition and was in fine shape for the match last night, which was reported to be one of the wildest Salem fans have seen.

Whether the two boys will meet here in a return match on the armory card dated for May 9, depends upon a physician's report on Fenton's damaged thumb, it was reported today. It is possible that the injury will not be sufficient to prevent a rematch, it was stated.

The armory card will feature a 10-round main event between Leo Turner, colored Portland middleweight, and Salor Jack Hogue of San Diego.

Good pitching and heavy hitting are two accredited methods of winning baseball games, and most clubs would be content to settle for one or the other.

The Sacramento Senators, however, it appears can take their choice, and that perhaps explains why the Solons are surveying the rest of the Pacific coast league race from an increasingly remote elevation.

Last night they made both choices almost simultaneously, with the result that Portland was obliged to assimilate an 11-7 defeat, its first in three games.

For a while at least Turpinville upheld the fling end of Sacramento's double distinction,

allowing Portland no runs and as many hits in three innings, while the Senators pounded Gonzales, who tossed a shutout in his last start, and Orrell for seven counters.

In the fourth, however, the Beavers began to bestir themselves as befits a club which stands second only to Sacramento in team batting, and by the end of the fifth, which saw Thompson's two-run homer, they trailed their rivals by a scant two tallies.

Thus the signal for Sacramento to call on its other resources, and Senator Stickers responded brilliantly. They fashioned four hits in a blistering seventh inning—four hits good for four runs that made Portland's final eighth-inning rally only a gesture.

Batting and pitching prowess in combination also accounted for Los Angeles' 12-9 victory over San Francisco in a second of the day's league games.

At Seattle the host Rainiers blanked San Diego, 3-0, as Turpin gave up only a pair of singles, one to Patchett and the other to Terry. Themselves limited

Rain kept Hollywood idle at Oakland, but San Diego's defeat left the Stars alone in possession of second place, five games behind Sacramento.
