Edwards, chairman of the selective service board, a retired Methodist minister, who performed the ceremony with great satisfaction to all concerned and with much relief to the new judge, who is immediately preparing himself with a copy of the marriage ceremony.

## Canal Dragged For Missing Indians

KLAMATH FALLS, May 1.—(AP)—Officials of the Indian agency today took over the search for two Indians whose bodies are believed to be in the government canal here.

The missing men, Tom Smith, 51, and Theodore Walker, 41, were on a party of six in a car that plunged into the canal early yesterday. One woman escaped from the sunken car and the body of another was found when the machine was pulled out, while the body of a one-year-old girl and another woman were found six miles downstream.

The canal, 50 feet wide and 10 feet deep, was being dragged throughout the six-mile section today after a thorough check convinced reservation officials the men had drowned.

An anti-climax to the tragedy was enacted late yesterday when two Indian women, the niece of one of the dead women and the fiancée of one of the missing men, threw themselves into the canal at the scene of the accident. They were quickly rescued and jailed on charges of disorderly conduct.

Funeral services were held in the Yoncalla cemetery Monday afternoon for the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lee Allen of Yoncalla. The child died at birth at a Eugene hospital. The services were arranged by Stearns mortuary, Oakland.
