WOOL

BOSTON, May 2.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Although activity in the Boston wool market has been little more pronounced this week than last there has been a noticeable stepping up of activity in the far west, especially in Oregon, Montana and Idaho and to a lesser extent in Washington and Utah. Prices are hardly changed but are fully firm both east and west."

"Manufacturers are evidently well covered against near-by requirements in raw wool and are not keen to buy further at the moment, although a few apparently are taking on a little domestic and some foreign fine wool at firm rates. A rather tight situation appears to be developing in the civilian end of the trade with allotments reported by some of the clothing manufacturers."

"Foreign markets are not notably changed for the week and not especially active. The shipping situation is giving increasing concern both as regards foreign and domestic wools."

"Mohair is less active and very firm."

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—(AP)—Federal Judge Fee sentenced Morton Charles Christensen, 43, to three years in federal prison yesterday for embezzlement of bank funds.

Federal bureau of investigation agents said Christensen, employed in the savings department of the Portland Trust and Savings bank for eight years, admitted taking the money and blamed his taste for gambling. A total of \$7176 was involved.
