SORORITY CELEBRATES TENTH ANNIVERSARY

On April 30 Beta Sigma Phi, international cultural and social sorority, celebrated its tenth anniversary. The ten years have been a decade of achievement. Founded at Abilene, Kansas, on April 30, 1931, by Walter W. Ross, to provide cultural growth to young women between the ages of 18 and 35, the sorority has grown until there are now 1170 chapters with a membership of 23,000. These chapters are located in every state in the union, and in Canada.

The local chapter of Beta Sigma Phi observed the Founders' day by a formal banquet at the Rose hotel, followed by a program and ritual of jewels ceremony at the home of Miss Frances Metzger.

An international convention is to be held at Kansas City, Mo., June 20, 21 and 22. This will be the first international convention for the organization and advance

ed registrations show an expected attendance of at least 2,000 members.

The highlight of the convention program will be an address by the Honorable Iva Campbell Fallis, a senator in the house of parliament, Canada. Senator Fallis is an honorary member of Beta Sigma Phi, and is also honorary chairman of the committee for Beta Sigma Phi war effort in Canada. The entire theme of this first convention is to be "National Defense."

"In the present emergency, the American Legion and its auxiliary is definitely on record favoring 'all practicable aid to Britain.'" This was one of the salient points made by Mrs. Louis J. Lemstra, national president of the American Legion auxiliary, who was a distinguished visitor to Oregon and Portland this week. "The American Legion and auxiliary have advocated national defense for so long that it is almost an old story," said Mrs. Lemstra. "Because of our knowledge of war, we know the infinite desirability for peace but we realize that war is still a possibility. For that reason the voices of the American Legion and auxiliary have been raised through the year to warn the people of the United States of their lack of national defense. Even though the nation has awakened at last to its danger we must continue to watch our defense program to see that it is not slowed or halted by those who would benefit most from a disarmed America," observed Mrs. Lemstra.

Among the honors accorded Mrs. Lemstra during her Portland visit was the privilege of occupying a position on the platform with Mrs. Franklin Roosevelt, first lady, who spoke before a large Portland audience Wednesday night under the auspices of Portland post, No. 1, the proceeds going to Greek relief.

May 24—Poppy Day
Twelve million memorial poppies are being made ready for distribution on Poppy day, May 24, to brighten America's memory of its world war dead. The poppies are now being completed by disabled veterans working in government hospitals in every part of the country. Many hundreds of veterans, for whom other employment would be impossible, have been given work in the poppy program. Non-compensated men have first call on the poppy jobs, preference going to those who have dependent families. Mrs. Irving Riegall, hospital chairman for the department of Oregon, states that the work of making poppies at the Roseburg facility is nearing completion. Poppies made by the men at the Roseburg hospital have been commended highly by state and national officers for the high quality of workmanship.

Poppy Funds Aid Child Welfare Program
The entire proceeds of the annual poppy sale by units throughout the United States go to Legion and auxiliary welfare funds, and forms a major means of support for the rehabilitation and child welfare programs of the two organizations.
