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The Ever-Growing Burden

EIGHTY MILLION Germans are now lording it over one hundred and fifty-two million other Europeans. There are nearly two underlings for every member of the conquering "master race."

The caterpillar-treaded Nazi legions have clanked successfully through a monotonous series of conquests—Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Denmark, Norway, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Belgium, France, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, and now Greece. It is an impressive record of conquest from the strictly military point of view.

Street crowds in Berlin are reported strangely silent, strangely lacking in jubilation, as victory piles on victory. Mussolini's caperings are understandable, and the joy of street crowds in Rome at the news that their Greek adventure had been pulled out of the fire for them by Hitler. But to the crowds in Berlin, the Greek victory was just one more victory. They are used to that. For a year and a half, one victory has followed another, but there is no end.

Strange and stubborn, those conquered "sub-peoples." Their armies are conquered. They fall. But all too many of them retain a pride that somehow doesn't go with the idea that they are "sub-peoples." And the Greeks, newest conquest, stood silent as the tanks rolled by the Parthenon hill, and their newspapers said, "Remember, Greeks, this, too, will pass!"

They cannot revolt, these hundred and fifty millions oppressed by eighty millions. The eighty millions have the tanks, and planes, and machine guns. But they can hate. And they can wait.

Some of them can even be forced by hunger to go to Germany and work to produce the fodder for the iron warhorse. Thousands of Italians, Poles, Czechs and Frenchmen are doing that.

Always there must be that overpowering sense that they are waiting, waiting for the time that must come. They feel that, the troops of occupation in a dozen scattered countries. They feel it in Berlin, where news of victory is accepted stolidly. They know that even if their legions win the Mediterranean, even if they crush England, the only result will be more millions of people waiting, waiting.

Nobody has ever built anything very enduring on that kind of a foundation. Nobody ever will. Nobody is doing it now.

among the weapons he is seeking to use.

SO much for Iraq. Watch it. It is hot. It will get hotter. Great events are centering around these desert wastes which have been so prominent in the history of the world.

NOTE also that the Germans (one feels that the Italians are driving harder at Tobruk every day. The dive bombers are appearing there in increasing numbers.

Tobruk is a British base of operations, supplied from the sea, that threatens the flank of the German advance into Egypt. It will have to be taken before they can safely go on—unless the annoying British fleet can be shut out of the Mediterranean.

In that connection, don't entirely forget Gibraltar.

THERE are some dispatches from home today. One, from Washington, relates that defense expenditures are expected to reach the rate of 24 billions a year by the beginning of the government's fiscal year on July 1.

That is five billions above Treasury Secretary Morgenthau's recent estimate of 19 billions. Under his theory of raising two-thirds by taxation it will mean adding SEVEN BILLIONS instead of three and a half billions to the nine billions to be raised by existing taxes.

Every time taxes are mentioned in the coming years, the total will be HIGHER. It will have to be.

MEANWHILE the Chamber of commerce of the United States, meeting in Washington, suggests that the non-military expenditures of government be DECREASED by two billion dollars. That sounds reasonable.

New Legislation On Forestry, Fires Discussed Here

A meeting of all sawmill and logging operators in the Douglas district, representatives of the state forestry department, U. S. forest service and O. & C. administration was held here Saturday at the headquarters of the Douglas Forest Protective association in Roseburg. L. C. Cummings, inspector for the state forestry department, acted as chairman, and discussion was led by J. J. Russell, assistant state forester from Salem. Short talks were given by Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the Douglas Forest association, and James Walker of the Lane county association. Discussions consisted of the interpretation of new forestry legislation and policies in regard to fire equipment, slash disposal and forest management that will be required of the operators during the coming fire season.

A summary of forestry requirements applying to operations on or within one-eighth mile of forest land consists of the following: Anyone conducting a forest operation in sawmilling, logging, piling or woodcutting must first secure a written permit from the state forester. Permits are required each year from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 and must show by legal subdivisions the area to be cut. Operations coming under the permit law shall maintain at operation a tool box with sufficient fire tools to equip the entire woods and or mill crew, but in no case less than four tools. Steam and internal combustion engines are to be equipped with an adequate spark arrester and a two quart fire extinguisher. Trucks transporting forest products over truck roads are to carry a two quart fire extinguisher, one shovel and one axe. All equipment operated within 150 feet of forest land must be cleared of all inflammable debris for a distance of 50 feet, and every such operator shall provide watchman service, which shall consist of not less than one competent man, who shall be on duty until 8 p. m. each day equipment is operated. All steam operations to maintain a steam pump of sufficient size to give 30 pounds pressure on 200 feet of one inch hose and one-fourth inch nozzle. Sawmills burning refuse must maintain an adequate refuse burner, sprinkling system or cleared fire line, which in the judgment of the forester is adequate to prevent the spread of fires. Each operation to maintain a weather instrument to take readings of the humidity, and close operation when the humidity reaches a low 30 per cent.

All fire equipment must be maintained at the operation on and after May 15, which is the beginning of fire season. Operations will be inspected periodically and all equipment requirements will be strictly enforced. The logging and sawmill industry in this district are to be commended on their cooperation with the forestry agencies, they are becoming more fire conscious and forestry minded each year. Mr. Southwick reports. The last four seasons only five fires have been caused by the industry, he states.

S. armed forces traveling on furlough, according to J. E. Clark, local agent for the railroad. Carrying a 30-day return limit, the special fares have been put into effect not only between all stations on Southern Pacific lines, but in connection with other railroads provide for transportation from all points of the country.

Vancouver Flash Slated on Fight Card in Roseburg

Jimmy Davis to Battle Young Nationalista, Replacing Fenton, Who Broke Thumb

Boxing fans of Roseburg and vicinity will have an opportunity to see Jimmy Davis, the Vancouver, Washington, high school boy who has been astonishing fight fans with his ability, in action at the Roseburg armory May 9, it was announced today. Davis has been signed to fight Young Nationalista in the six-round semifinal, replacing Babe Fenton, who was forced to withdraw from the match because of a broken thumb. Rudy Ritzman, local matchmaker, reported that Davis, who is rated as one of the most promising young fighters of the Pacific northwest, eagerly accepted the battle, which will put him into the "big time" if he can win the bout.

Nationalista was claimant to the Oregon lightweight championship until he was beaten early this week in Salem by Fenton, who fractured the thumb of his right hand in the third round of the engagement. Fenton has since filed formal claim to the Oregon title. The two had been matched for a return engagement on the card to be held here next week, but Fenton's physician has forbidden the use of the damaged hand for several weeks.

Davis, who is still in high school, has had a number of professional fights in Washington. Despite his extreme youth, he has bested some of the veterans in his class and with a chance to put himself in line for a championship is expected, Ritzman states, to do his best in the battle with the wild-swinging and unorthodox Filipino.

Friday's card is to feature a 10-round main event between Leo Turner, colored middleweight of Portland, claimant of the northwest middleweight championship, and Sailor Jack Hogue of San Diego, a newcomer in the northwest boxing field.

Whirlaway Wins Kentucky Derby; New Mark Set

NEW YORK, May 5.—(AP)—Whether Whirlaway, owned by Ben Jones of Parnella, Mo., returns to rags and rag-like ways or takes a crown on the three-year-old crowd will be determined Saturday when the Kentucky derby winner hooks up with Bold Irishman in the \$75,000 preakness at Pimlico. It's going to be a mighty long time before Whirlaway's record-smashing performance in the derby is forgotten by the 100,000 who saw the little chestnut burn up Churchill Downs home-stretch Saturday with 2:01 2/5 clocking, beat Twenty Grand's mark by 2 1/2 of a second.

The derby victory, worth \$61,275 and the richest in the stake's history, boosted Whirlaway's earnings for two seasons to \$145,326 for the son of the English derby winner, Blenheim.

Ben Jones won in 1938 with Lawrin. The night before the big race, Jones sketched a map of the track for jockey Eddie Arcaro, showing him just where he wanted Whirlaway to be at each point. Arcaro, who never had ridden the colt until Friday morning, obeyed instructions well.

As much as 17 lengths back at the half-mile post, Arcaro moved Whirlaway into a contending position rounding the last turn. Then came the thunderbolt. He shot between the pace-setting Porter's Cap and Blue Pair, and pulled away to win by eight lengths, running the last quarter in 24 seconds.

He left Hugh Nesbitt's Staretor and Lou Tufano's Market Wise to fight it out for second with the decision going to Staretor. The remainder of the field was strung out far down the stretch.

Four Coast Teams Split Pair of Doubleheaders

(By the Associated Press) Storms at Portland and Seattle washed out half the day's doubleheader program, leaving Hollywood and Oakland, San Francisco and Los Angeles in charge of carrying the Pacific coast league torch yesterday.

The four teams finished the day's pursuits all square, Oakland splitting with Hollywood 13-3 and 1-9, and San Francisco dividing with Los Angeles 11-5 and 10-11.

Shut-Out by Elliott Aids to Drop Huskies

Indians, Cardinals Keep On Winning To Lead Leagues

Bobby Feller is due to go back to work for the Cleveland Indians today, which is enough to make the American league leaders a good bet to run their winning streak to 11 straight against the Washington Senators.

Since that surprising kayo the Chicago White Sox hung on his chin opening day, Master Robert has won four starts.

In running their victories through 10 straight—the latest a 12-4 bout of the Senators yesterday—the Tribe's grade-A hurling staff has yielded only a fraction more than seven safeties per contest.

Hitting held the upper hand yesterday, in fact, for while Smith and Clint Brown, his relief man, were being touched for 11 hits, the Indian sluggers came through with 15 that included a six-run outburst in the eighth against Zuber, a former Cleveland pitcher. This hoisted the team hitting performance to better than 10 safeties a game during the streak.

The Philadelphia Athletics set the day's high in their 17-11 victory over the White Sox.

The New York Yankees, still in second place, fell three and a half games off Cleveland's pace when Newsom of Detroit set them on their collective ear 10-1, with a five-hit pitching job.

In St. Louis Lefty Grove hung up his first victory of the year as the Boston Red Sox thumped the Browns, 11-4.

Rookie Blanks Champs.

A rookie pitcher, Tom Hughes, was the day's standout performer in the National league. The 21-year-old philly hurler set down the world champion Cincinnati Reds, 3-0, with three singles, only two Reds getting as far as third. The front-running St. Louis Cardinals ran their string to nine in a row. Held to six hits by the Braves, the Cards bunched five of them in the eighth against Salvo for all their runs and a 3-1 victory.

An error that paved the way for four unearned runs, three of them on Fletcher's homer, helped the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 6-4 triumph over the Brooklyn Dodgers, and cost Hamilton his first defeat.

Another sort of streak was broken when the New York Giants, who hadn't won in seven starts, belted six Chicago Cub pitchers for 13 hits and a 9-4 score.
