

U. S. Ready to Fight for Democracy—Roosevelt

Washington indicated a growing pressure for further specific action on the problem of delivering war supplies to Britain, and the whole subject apparently was due for an early and thorough airing in the senate.

"Ready to Fight Again." "We are meeting here today to dedicate a new shrine of freedom," Mr. Roosevelt said. "By this action we are bearing true witness to the faith that is in us—a simple faith in the freedom of democracy in the world."

"It is the kind of faith for which we have fought before, for the existence of which we are ever ready to fight again."

Willkie Backs Aid Plan. Indication of increasing support for proposals to assure delivery of war supplies to Britain appeared in two quarters here.

Wendell L. Willkie, the republican leader, declared that "we should protect our cargoes of arms and food to England," and he characterized the operations of the United States neutrality patrol—designed to provide safe lane in the western Atlantic—as inadequate.

At the capitol, it was reported that Senator Pepper (D., Fla.), would make a speech today advocating war shipments to Britain, and administration leaders said they would not seek to avoid a senate showdown on a proposal by Senator Tobey (R., N. H.) to put congress on record against naval convoys of war shipments to Britain.

The administration recently shelved Tobey's resolution in the senate foreign affairs committee, but leaders said today they would not resort to parliamentary devices to prevent debate should Tobey now force the issue to the floor. Democratic Leader Barkley predicted that the proposal would be defeated overwhelmingly.

Adverse Voices Heard. Senator Nye commented that Willkie was not representing the preponderance of sentiment in the republican party in pledging support for any action the president might take.

In commenting on President Roosevelt's assertion about Americans being "ever ready to fight" for democracy, Nye remarked that the statement "can mean much or mean little."

Senator Clark (D., Idaho), another critic of administration policy, declared that if the United States attempted "to fight for democracy in our present condition we will fail not only to save it abroad but will destroy it at home."

(AP)—Wage negotiations between 4,000 CIO loggers and Columbia river basin lumber operators reopened here today under federal mediation.

Charles A. Wheeler of the U. S. labor department acted as chairman. The loggers ask a 15-cent-an-hour pay increase. Negotiations were stalemated last week with employers' refusal to grant more than 7%.

Wheeler said he would return to Seattle tonight to participate in discussions between Alaska fishing employers and the AFL machinists' union, whose dispute is holding 25,000 men from fishing grounds.

stored between the two countries.

Reliable reports in London were that Britain was ready to accept prospective Turkish mediation of the conflict.

The Iraq government was reported to have cut the pipeline flow of oil to the Mediterranean, but the British declared that ample reserves of fuel had been built up to prevent a shortage from crippling operations of the British Mediterranean fleet.

The British communiqué said that fresh fighting had broken out in the Salum sector, on the Egyptian-Libyan frontier, and that heavy losses had been inflicted on axis troops and vehicles.

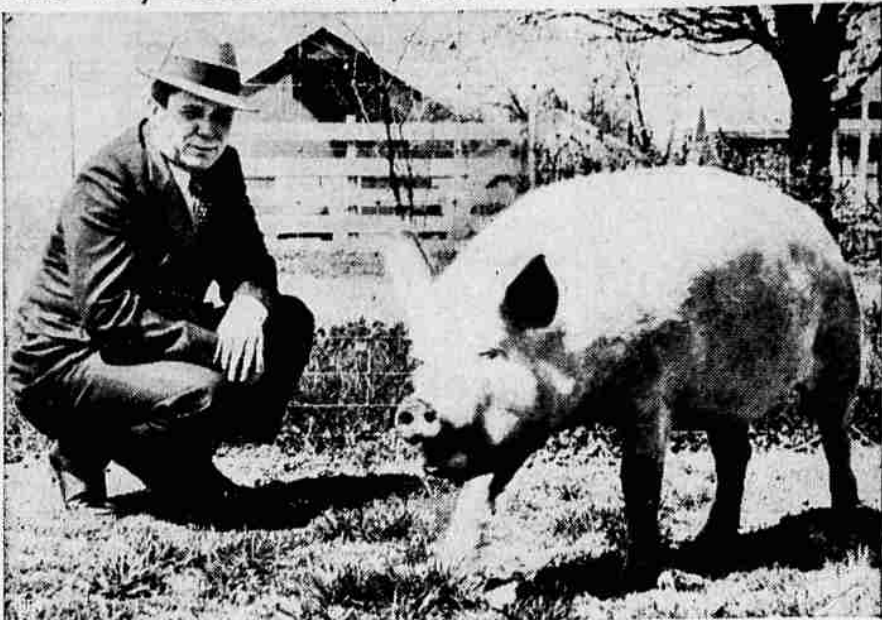
Crete Defense Planned.

Britain's determination to support the government of Greece's King George II on the Isle of Crete, 75 miles south of the Hellenic mainland, was seen in an announcement that Maj. Gen. B. C. Freyburg, commander-in-chief of the New Zealand expeditionary force, has been appointed chief of allied forces on the island.

The Germans indicated last week that Crete would be an early objective of Germany's Balkan legions, and over the week-end the British reported shooting down four raiders attacking the island.

A Reuters' British news agency dispatch from Tangier said Spain assumed control of customs today at that former internationalized zone in Africa, just across from Gibraltar.

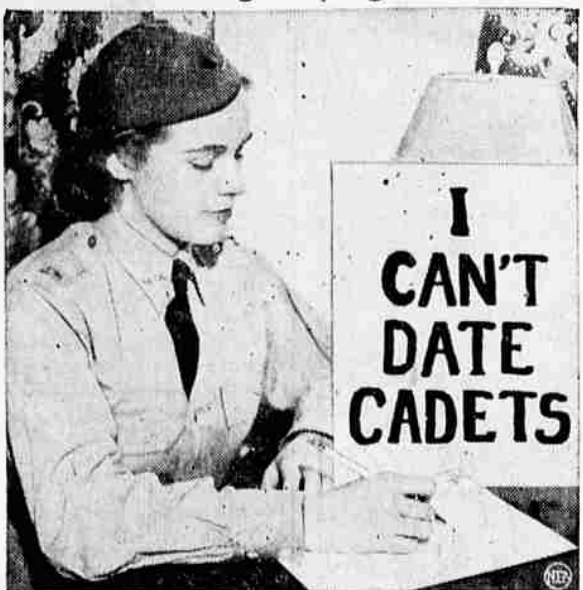

at Rotterdam, Antwerp, La Havre, Brest, Cherbourg, St. Nazaire and a Nazi-held airdrome at Quereville.

At Brest, the London air ministry reported, RAF bombs scored fresh hits on the German battleships Gneisenau and Scharnhorst in the 15th assault in five weeks.

"Many heavy bombs were dropped and hits were observed on and very near the battle cruisers," the air ministry said. "The docks on both sides of the harbor were hit and large fires started."

Heavy Damage Inflicted By Nazi Raiders, Claim

BERLIN, May 5.—(AP)—Luftwaffe raiders pounding Belfast, northern Ireland, last night set

afire four ships in the harbor and started tremendous fires and explosions in aircraft industrial plants, the German high command announced today.

The daily war bulletin spoke of Belfast as "an important transit harbor," referring, apparently to its possible use as a receiving point for war supplies from the United States.

The Vickers-Armstrong aircraft

plant at Belfast was said to have been left in flames.

Other Nazi units blasted, for the fourth night in a row, at the Merseyside area around Liverpool, also considered an important port of entry for American supplies. Germans called Saturday night's big-scale raid on Liverpool one of the heaviest ever made on a British city.

Barrow-in-Furness, port 50

miles northwest of Liverpool, drew one of the heaviest assaults aimed at this west coast area, the high command said.

DUHLIN, May 5.—(AP)—A plane of unidentified nationality dropped high explosive bombs at Carthage Hill, County Donegal, early this morning, shattering windows throughout the neighborhood.
