Alien Round-Up In U. S. Ordered By Atty. Gen. Jackson

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(AP)—Attorney General Jackson said today there were 6,000 deport-

able aliens who are still "free" in the United States as he ordered the round-up of 160 German seamen for questioning.

The justice department revealed that officers had been directed to round-up the seamen who were supposed to be in New York, Miami, San Francisco, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Kansas City under an agreement permitting their freedom after de-

portation orders were completed but could not be executed for lack of machinery.

The department also said that 125 Italian seamen were taken from Ellis Island last night to Fort Missoula, Mont., to be held in an army camp taken over there for detention of aliens. It is planned eventually to put all the interned Italians at the fort. The men were members of the crew of a ship taken into protective custody in the Panama canal. The 160 seamen were on tankers of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey when they were transferred to Panamanian registry, a justice department official said. They were removed from the crews and the company agreed to provide upkeep for men, who were to maintain fixed residence, notify of any change of address, and follow other regulations as there was no way to deport them.

"We have over 6,000 deportable aliens, against whom proceedings have been completed and deportation orders are outstanding," Jackson related. "But, because of transportation breakdown or because of refusal of their native countries to accept their return, they are still here. They are not only here, they are free."

"They include some bad criminals and a considerable number of communists proven to have advocated overthrow of our government by force and violence. But we can cite to the courts no statute to authorize us to do anything whatever with them when deportation fails. Hence they are turned loose in habeas corpus proceedings and resume their evil ways in our society."

Turner-Hogue Go Will Have Lively Supporting Card

"Box Car" Kline, and "Jungle Town Kid" was signed to box in one of the four-round spots on the northwest middleweight title match at the Roseburg armory Friday night, it was announced late yesterday by Rudy Ritzman, matchmaker. Kline will meet another middleweight in Joey Littlefield of Chehalis. "Box Car" has been boxing semi-finals in Salem the last year and is just about ready for main event spots down at the capital city, according to reports.

Littlefield has a very impressive record and should give Kline quite an argument for four rounds. He has had over 50 fights and is considered one of the best boxers to come out of Chehalis since the days of Pete Corbin.

The main eventers, Sailor Jack Hogue and "Leo the Lion" Turner are winding up their heavy training today and will take a day off Thursday. They will only go through the drying out process to be sure to come in under prescribed weight. Turner thought for a while he might have trouble making the 160 pound limit, but after his last work out he weighed 162 pounds and says he will probably weigh in at 158 pounds the day of the match. Hogue, who says it is no trouble for him to make the limit, will arrive in Roseburg early Friday morning. He has been promised a shot in the main event at Seattle provided he can defeat Turner.

There will be a six-round semi-final in the lightweight division when the wild swinging Filipino, Young Nationalista, meets High School Jimmy Davis. This bout should provide plenty of action and the top four-rounder will find Keller Wagner of Salem clashing with Charlie Geer of Portland in the heavyweight division. One more four-round bout will complete the program.

Interim Boards Of Legislature Of Oregon Announced

SALEM, May 7.—(AP)—Speaker of the House Robert S. Farrell, Jr., announced today his appointments on interim committees of the 1941 legislature.

On the important industrial development commission which will make a study of Oregon's tax system, its cost of government and resources Farrell named Reps. C. T. Hockett (R-Wallowa), J. D. Perry (D-Columbia), Frank J. Loneragan (R-Multnomah), William M. McAllister (R-Jackson) and John B. McCourt (R-Multnomah).

Farrell appointed Reps. Burt K. Snyder (R-Lake), William H. Hedlund (D-Clackamas) and Roy E. Carter (D-Curry) on another interim committee to study taxes paid by motor and rail transportation companies to determine if they are paying an equitable share of the taxes.

Rep. James A. Rodman (R-Lane) was named chairman of a committee to investigate activities of the state welfare commission. Others on the house committee are Reps. Manley J. Wilson (D-Clatsop), Richard L. Newberger (D-Multnomah), Alfred F. Cunha (R-Umatilla) and Allan G. Carson (R-Marion).

Other appointments were: Committee to make a survey of state institutions to determine need for improved facilities—Reps. Carl Engdahl (R-Umatilla), Dr. J. E. Hosch (D-Deschutes), George R. Duncan (R-Marion), Phil Brady (D-Multnomah), and Stanhope S. Pier (R-Multnomah).

Germany Cuts French Cost of Army Support

VICHY, France, May 7.—(AP)—It was officially announced today that Vice Premier Admiral Darlan and German authorities at Paris had reached an agreement "envisaging" a 25 per cent reduction in the cost of supporting the German army of occupation.

The prospect was that France's daily payment of 400,000,000 francs (nominally \$10,000,000) would be cut to 300,000,000 francs.

The official announcement said that the agreement also covered a slight loosening of restrictions along the demarcation line between occupied and unoccupied France.

The announcement said nothing about the concessions by the French in exchange for these things.

Years of Exile End for 'Iron Man'



Five years of exile in the United States ended when General Plutarco Elias Calles, former president and "Iron Man" of Mexico, left San Diego, Calif., for Mexico City.
