With Major Hoople Oversight Cuts Rate of Jobless Compensation

SALEM, Ore., May 7.—(AP)—Because of an oversight in making last minute amendments in the unemployment compensation law in the 1941 legislature, one-fifth instead of one-sixth of non-seasonal earnings may be drawn by seasonal employees, Attorney General Van Winkle ruled today.

The last minute oversight occurred when compromise bills were being hastily drawn by a senate and house conference committee in the last hour of the legislature.

While seasonal claimants may draw slightly more during their

off season, their total benefits will not be increased as they are still limited to one-sixth of the base year earnings.

Dog's Actions Indicate Missing Boy Drowned

WESTWOOD, Calif., May 7.—(AP)—A three-day search for three-year-old Billy Wayne DeForest, who disappeared after assuring his mother "I won't go away," ended yesterday on the shore of Lake Almanor.

Hundreds of men and boys, who searched miles of forest and lake shore, abandoned the hunt when the boy's dog at first refused to leave the Hamilton branch

dock and returned to the same spot every time he was taken away. Searchers said unquestionably the boy drowned.
