School District Merger Petition Turned Down

Proposal to consolidate two school districts, which combined would have only one student of elementary school age, was rejected here today when the county school boundary board denied the petition.

The Sunshine Valley district, which has no children of elementary school age, had proposed consolidation with the Dixonville district, which has only one pupil, who is being transported to an adjoining district. Dixonville, however, voted down the proposed merger.

It is anticipated that the Sunshine district will be dissolved and the territory divided between adjacent districts. The action will come at the June meeting of the boundary board.

Food Prices Advancing In Portland Market

PORTLAND, May 8.—(AP)—The high-cost-of-living, eternal companion of war, was thrown into bold relief on Portland markets today, the Journal announced.

The price on flour advanced 20 cents a barrel. Some shops said they would continue the old price until they had to renew stocks. Butter prices were up a full cent per pound. Eggs advanced a cent or more a dozen.
