

German Editors Face Deportation From U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—(AP)—Two representatives of a German news agency were held without bail at Ellis Island, N. Y., today on deportation charges filed by the justice department.

The two, Manfred Zapp and Guenther Tonn, were taken into custody late yesterday. Both are German citizens, and already were under indictment for failure to register as foreign agents, in connection with the operation of Transocean, a Nazi news agency. The agency has no affiliation with any American news service.

The indictment described Zapp as manager of the agency, Tonn as his assistant.

Umpqua River Harbor Gets "If" Appropriation

The sum of \$55,000 for additional improvement work on the Umpqua river harbor was authorized in the rivers and harbors committee recommendations in congress today, but it was specified that the appropriations would be made only when expenditures "will not materially interfere" with national defense. Only four specific appropriations were recommended in the bill out of nearly 200 projects authorized. Other projects will be given appropriations when funds become available, it was stated.

Noted Couple Die Within Few Hours of Each Other

CAMBRIDGE, England, May 8.—(AP)—Surviving her noted husband, Sir James George Frazer, by only a few hours, Lady Frazer died during the night.

Sir James, 87, was well-known as an anthropologist and authority on folklore and gained wide attention as the author of "The Golden Bough," a vast collection of the beliefs and customs of savage and civilized peoples.

His wife, the former Mrs. Lily Grove, a native of France, also was known as a writer.

It was understood that both deaths resulted from the infirmities of old age.

rent wage scale or the increase sought by the CIO union.

In the General Motors case, involving 60 scattered factories and 165,000 workmen, the union has asked an increase of 10 cents an hour and the corporation in reportedly has offered 2 cents. The present rates were not indicated.

Two Disputes Settled.

The national mediation board obtained an agreement last night in the J. Sklar Manufacturing company dispute, which has been before the board since April 6. The plant, at Long Island City, N. Y., employs 500 men and makes surgical instruments.

Settlement terms called for wage increases of 5 cents an hour for those making less than 50 cents an hour, and increases "up

to 5 cents" an hour for those making more than 50 cents, establishment of grievance machinery, and a no-strike, no-lockout clause.

Tentative settlement of a week-old strike at the Packard Electric division of General Motors corporation at Warren, Ohio, was announced by Michael J. Crosetto, federal conciliator. Terms of settlement were not announced.

The CIO union had struck for a wage increase of 10 cents an hour and to protest dismissal of certain employees. Current wage rates range from 50 cents to \$1.15 an hour.

Funeral Held for Man Killed in S. P. Yards

Funeral services for Joseph Trzepak, who was killed in the S. P. yards Sunday, May 4, were held this morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Morris H. Roach officiating. Interment was in the county cemetery. The Douglas Funeral home had charge of arrangements.

Efforts were made to trace his relatives and residence before coming to Roseburg in Nov., 1940, but thus far local officers have been unable to find anything of his past history. An alien registration card was found on the body and efforts are being made to trace him through the FBI office in Washington, D. C. He had been employed by Pete Crawford of Myrtle Creek, cutting cedar bolts, and evidently was attempting to catch the south bound freight to Myrtle Creek when he was killed.

then was said to have been chased back across the channel by RAF fighters. Other raiders were operating in pairs four miles in the air over several south coast districts.

The role of Americans in the struggle was highlighted, meanwhile, in a report by Robert Hutchinson, chairman of the American Eagle club in London, that 10,000 United States citizens are fighting in the British and allied forces.

Nazis Deal New Damage

Anti-aircraft defenses claimed destruction of an additional Nazi raider last night, bringing to 73 the total reported shot down thus far in May, but the government acknowledged that even the record-breaking achievement of the night fighters failed to prevent the Luftwaffe from inflicting heavy damage on vital water front areas, including Liverpool, which was attacked for the seventh consecutive night. Casualties were feared heavy.

British officials naturally were jubilant over the Nazis' rising costs for night raiding, but they warned against over-optimism and acknowledged that such results could not be expected on cloudy nights.

British Harbors Lashed By German Air Raiders

BERLIN, May 8.—(AP)—Large bomber formations pounded the "transit ports" of Liverpool and Hull last night, destroying England's shipping facilities and setting huge fires in the harbor areas, and made other wide-ranging attacks on the ports of Hartle-

pool, Middlesbrough, Bristol and Plymouth, the German high command said today.

Submarines and bombers sank 41,950 tons of shipping in the North Atlantic and near England, the daily communique said.

German long-range artillery, too, opened up on harbor objectives, and the high command said damage was done to "war-vital" objectives at Dover.

Nine British Spitfires were shot down yesterday during British thrusts, it was declared.

But the only damage in Germany reported by the command, was in Bremen, where houses were admitted to have been damaged and a number of civilians killed and injured. Three of the raiding bombers were declared shot down.

Blows Struck at Tobruk

Stukas were reported to have made an effective attack on the waterworks and water distilling plant at Tobruk, Africa. The distilling works was said to have been destroyed. Direct hits were declared to have been scored also on an anti-aircraft battery southeast of Tobruk harbor.

Berlin authorities are reported preparing for heavier blows under the lash of the British counter-attack.

Nazi officials were said to be making a canvass of all homes in the German capital to find shelter for bombed-out residents; and Jewish families were ordered to live in more restricted quarters so that all or part of their apartments could be turned over to Aryans.

It was explained that while comparatively few houses in Berlin have been wrecked by bombs so far, the RAF's latest raids—with the new British "super-bombs" and incendiaries—have indicated what might be expected this summer.

British Claim Control Of Situation in Iraq Sector

CAIRO, Egypt, May 8.—(AP)—British planes bombed the Baghdad airport yesterday and scored direct hits on a magazine at Washash, near the Iraq capital, a British Royal Airforce middle east communique declared today.

Otherwise, middle east general headquarters said, the Iraq situation, both at the British-held Habbaniyah airport and the port of Basra, has remained quiet since the siege of Habbaniyah was broken two days ago. There was sporadic sniping at Habbaniyah, however.

"Heavy and successful raids" against Bengasi and the axis-held airdromes at Berka, Benina and Derna, repeated targets for the RAF since German and Italian forces launched their counter-offensive eastward into Egypt, also were reported.

At Bengasi, bombs were said to

have hit the central breakwater and to have struck near ships.

Direct hits on two merchant ships were claimed in an attack on an axis Mediterranean convoy.

The brief communique reported only activity of British patrols in the Tobruk and Salum sectors of the North African front.

In Ethiopia, it said British forces were drawing closer to Amba Alaji, the last Italian stronghold on the Addis Ababa-Asmara road and had captured additional prisoners.

4 c. rhubarb cut in 1/2-in. pieces
1 c. White Satin sugar
3/4 c. flour (level)
1 egg
1/2 cup. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt

2 tbs. orange juice
1 egg
1/2 cup. oil
1/2 cup. butter

Use strawberry rhubarb. Do not remove skin. Cover rhubarb with boiling water for three min.; drain. Blend flour, sugar and salt. Add rhubarb and orange juice; then well-beaten egg and butter. Line pie tin with pastry and fill with rhubarb mixture. Bake in hot oven (400°) until crust starts to brown on edges. Partially cool pie and top with meringue. Place in oven (325°) to brown.

MERINGUE

2 egg whites
1 tsp. lemon juice
4 tbs. sugar
1/2 tsp. baking powder

Beat egg whites until frothy, add baking powder, add sugar, one tablespoon at a time, and continue beating until stiff and smooth.
