

Dodgers Nose Out Cardinals; Yanks Halt Cleveland

The first five clubs in the American league are separated today by a total of only 41 games. The national league again is in its hard-to-explain predicament of having the Cards in first place by percentage although the Brooklyn Dodgers lead in games won and lost.

The Dodgers, in fact, destroyed the legend that St. Louis had a collection of supermen yesterday. They wrung out a 4-3 decision when Manager Southworth switched his pitchers four times for six batters in the last two innings and in spite of this intense strategy let Brooklyn load the bases without a hit and with none out in the ninth.

The Cardinals are clever and they are almost unbelievably fast. In the seventh inning, with runners on first and second, Pitcher Warneke sacrificed and both men scored—just to give you a gauge of their speed.

This gave Warneke a 3-1 lead going into the last of the eighth and he had given only three hits. But as soon as he gave up two singles in succession Southworth, who had used four hurlers to pitch a losing six-hit game at Boston Tuesday, began shuffling his staff and completely emptied his bullpen before Reese singled home the winning run in the ninth.

Yanks Climb to 2nd Spot.

The Indians, who had great pitching and timely hitting during their 11-game winning streak, got neither against the New York Yankees as they mired down 7-5 on a rain-soaked diamond.

This victory bounced the Yanks from fourth to second place in one hop and the Boston Red Sox leaped from fifth to third with an 11-inning, 4-3 decision over the Chicago White Sox. The margin between Rigney and Wagner in their pitching duel was Ted Williams, who hit two home runs, one of them in the 11th to win for Wagner.

The Detroit Tigers, after a day in second place and minus Hank Greenberg for the first time, were whipped 4-2 by the Washington Senators and slipped to fourth. Hudson smothered the Tigers with six-hit hurling.

The St. Louis Browns captured a marathon 14-inning affair from the Philadelphia Athletics 6-5 with Cullenbine starring. He hit a three-run homer in the fifth and singled home the winning run in the 14th.

Shortstop Sets Record.

A homer by Lombardi was the only run of the game as the Cincinnati Reds squeezed the New York Giants 1-0. Schumacher gave five hits to Walters' seven. But the Reds made four double plays in the first four innings and Joost set a major league record for shortstops by handling 19 fielding chances.

The Chicago Cubs climbed out of the cellar by lambasting the Phillies 11-2. Big Bill Lee not only pitched five-hit ball, but supplied two home runs.
