

Brooklyn Dodgers Grab First Place From Cardinals

The Brooklyn Dodgers have taken complete command of the National League. They have faced every club in the circuit during their past 15 games and won 13 of them. They captured three out of four from the world champion Cincinnati Reds last week and now they have swept a two-game series from the St. Louis Cardinals.

The climax to this sensational stand came yesterday in the shape of a 5-4, 12-inning triumph over the Redbirds.

The victory gave the Dodgers a game and a half margin in first place and exposed the Cardinals as a dangerous but disorganized array. St. Louis outfielders collided on two different fly balls and the infield proved porous.

In the only other game yesterday in the senior circuit, Vern

Olsen scattered 10 hits and smacked a three-run homer to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 5-1 decision over the Phillies. The only run against him was a round-tripper by Litwiler in the eighth. Yankees beat Indians.

In the American league the New York Yankees took another cut out of the Cleveland Indians' lead with a 5-4 victory in a slug-fest session that included 13 hits for New York and 11 for the Tribe. Red Ruffing hit a home run, a double and a single to bolster his pitching, and received credit for the victory, although Johnny Murphy had to help out with 3 1/2 innings of shutout relief pitching.

The Washington Senators muzzled the Detroit Tigers, 7-1, with a 14-hit offensive to back up the six-hit hurling of Sundra. It was the fourth loss for Buck Newsom, who lasted only till the fourth inning.

Suder hit a home run with two on in the eighth to provide the Philadelphia Athletics a 9-6 margin over the St. Louis Browns.

Titular Bout To Headline Card at Armory Tonight

The boxing arena at the Roseburg armory was being made ready today for the first American Legion card of the 1941 season, as principals for tonight's program gathered in the city for the scheduled contests.

The main event will bring together Leo Turner, negro claimant of the northwest middleweight championship, and Sailor Jack Hope, San Diego. The title will be at stake in the 10-round battle.

Turner has appeared previously in the Roseburg ring, and has made himself very popular with local fans. Reports are that he has greatly improved in both boxing and hitting ability since his last appearance here.

The six-round semi-final will feature Jimmy Davis, Vancouver lightweight, against the wild swine Filipino, Young Nationalista.

A four-round bout will feature Keller Wagner of Salem against Charlie Geer of Portland. Geer has had more experience than his younger Salem opponent, but Wagner is rated the harder puncher and has won his last two fights by knockouts. In another four-rounder, Clyde Yates of Klamath Falls will meet Len Harris of Seattle. Both are welterweights. Two or more additional preliminaries will be included on the card.
