O. in three rounds over Charlie Geer, Portland, 174. Johnny O'Connell, 147, Portland, decided Tommy Trollinger, 150, Salem in four rounds. Clyde Yates, 143, Klamath Falls, scored a third round knockout over Art Hawkins, 146, Aurora.
