Public Bidden To Inspect Facility

The general public is being invited by the management and staff at the U. S. Veterans Administration facility in Roseburg to inspect the institution between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m., Monday, May 12. The public inspection has been arranged in celebration of National Hospital day.

The facility, which is located on a reservation of 457 acres, represents an investment of nearly a million and a half dollars, and has an annual operating cost of approximately \$375,000. It provides accommodations for 378 patients and has an average population of about 500.

Approximately 230 persons are employed, including 20 nurses, 90 attendants, seven physicians, one dentist and one dental assistant.

The hospital has its own telephone system, fire department and police department.

The equipment includes the very latest developed for medical science.

Guides will show visitors through the facility and will be glad, it is stated, to answer questions of observers regarding the institution, its methods of operation and policies.

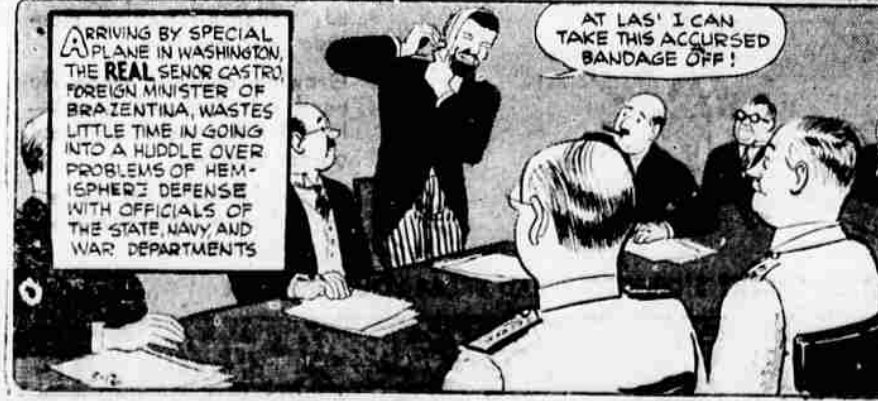
