Berlin, Rhine Area, Coast Cries Blasted by RAF

port facilities on the Scottish east coast and southeast England, the Berlin high command said.

Two merchantmen totalling 3,000 tons were sunk by the air force and three others damaged, the communique went on. A British destroyer, it was claimed, was claimed, was set afire south of the Portsmouth naval base.

(Informed sources in Berlin said the airports attacked last night in southern and central England included Lincoln and Cambridge, where hangars and shelters were set afire. Fires were said to have been started also in a light metal plant near Slough and direct hits were reported on workshops of an aluminum plant at Warrington and an arms factory in Nottingham.)

A stick of bombs dropped by a single raider on a southeast coast town killed 7 persons and injured a number of others this afternoon.

Dutch Fliers Aid Britain
Royal Dutch naval fliers, using U. S.-built Hudson (Lockheed) planes, joined British pilots in attacking Nazi airdromes in Norway last night on the eve of the first anniversary of the German invasion of the lowlands—the air ministry news service said today.

With the cooperation of the British coastal command, the Dutch attacked airdromes at Kristiansand and Mandal, both in southern Norway, and reported that they kept high explosives and incendiaries dropping most of the night. The crews said numerous fires were started.

At the same time docks at Kristiansand were bombed.

Belgians Also Give Help
The anniversary of the German invasion of a year ago today found the exiled government both of the Netherlands and Belgium fighting on as cogs in the allied war machine based in Britain.

"The center of Belgian resistance is in the Congo," a Belgian spokesman asserted today.

That African colony, he continued, equipped the "Free Belgian" forces participating in the fighting in Ethiopia, and all its vast deposits of copper and cobalt are being sold to England.

The tonnage of the Netherlands both warships and merchantmen, is proving a valuable source of help to Britain. A number of Dutch submarines, cruisers and armed trawlers constantly are on duty in the battle of the Atlantic.

"There are 68,000,000 Hollanders in the Dutch East Indies and South America," a Netherlands spokesman said. "We are paying our way in this war. Our empire is still intact."

New Sewage Disposal Plant Works Perfectly

latter is a concrete tank, 135 feet in diameter and 8 feet deep. It is filled with 3,000 cubic yards of crushed rock and gravel.

The water drawn from sewage is sprinkled over the rock and gravel of the filter by two spray

revolving spray arms, operating in a manner similar to revolving types of lawn sprinklers. The rocks and gravel, it is explained, quickly form a bacterial coating which destroys organic matter and removes all impurities.

After passing through the filter, the water goes into a secondary clarifier, where it is further purified before being turned back into the river. Before being returned to the stream the sewage water has been purified to a point where it has less bacterial count and a higher percentage of oxygen than water used for domestic purposes, Mr. Stockman declares.

Action Like That of Septic Tank

Solids, pumped from the primary clarifier into the sludge digester, are broken up into water, gas and a mineral sludge, through bacterial action, Mr. Stockman reports. As it will take several weeks for the bacteria to develop, the sludge digester at present is being operated with lime. The digester is a large covered tank, where the action is similar to that of a septic tank. To speed action, however, it is kept heated to 130 degrees by means of hot water coils. Gas taken from the tank is used to heat the water and surplus gas is burned through a waste vent. Water is put back into the clarifying system, and the mineral sludge is drawn off about three times each year.

The plant is so arranged that recirculation can be controlled through any or all tanks. Operation is fully automatic, except the sludge pumps which must be manually controlled. In the event of overload or stoppage of any automatic equipment, an alarm bell sounds and all switches are automatically opened to halt machinery.

The plant at present is handling approximately 550,000 gallons of sewage daily. This will be increased to from 600,000 to 700,000 gallons when the South Roseburg and Laurelwood sewers are connected. The equipment, however, is designed to

handle more than one million gallons of sewage per day, and will accommodate a city of at least 10,000 population, Mr. Stockman reports. An even greater population could be accommodated in the event of a separation of storm and sanitary sewers, as the great bulk of the sewage now passing through the plant is surface water.

Two pumps are provided at the plant and at the present only the smaller of the pumps is being used, and it is still not operating at capacity, giving plenty of reserve for the plant, the engineer states.

Interesting Features
An interesting feature is a measuring flume which provides for accurate measurement of the plant's operation. This flume was invented by a close friend of Mr. Stockman's, the inventor also having been an instructor of Harvey L. Eppstein, city engineer, who has been supervisor of construction work.

Another interesting arrangement is the system provided for chlorination. Chlorine is used if conditions arise which prevent the plant from functioning efficiently, and in the Roseburg plant, the system is so designed that chlorine can be added in any desired amount at any point in the treatment process.

The Roseburg disposal plant is particularly pleasing to Mr. Stockman, he reports, because of the economy of construction, compactness of design and efficiency of operation. Specializing in sewage treatment work since 1899, he has built plants in all parts of the Pacific northwest, and is now engaged in construction of plants at Eugene, Oregon, and Nampa and Rupert, Idaho, with two other like jobs in prospect.

Plant Superintendent Named

James Miller, for many years a member of the city street department, has been appointed by Mayor A. J. Young as superintendent of the plant, subject to the approval of the city council. Mr. Miller has been instructed in the

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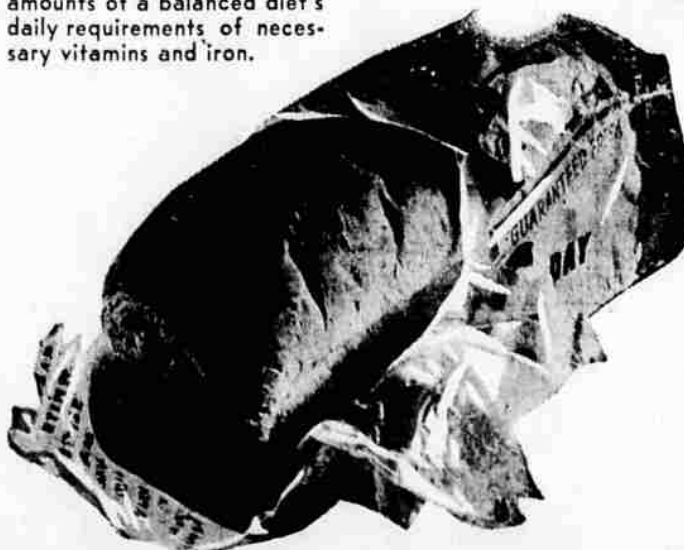


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
