

Name Keeps Abeel In Suit Title But He's Not Involved

The folk who have names far down in the alphabetical list don't realize how lucky they are, according to Paul Abeel, proprietor of Paul's Market. The name Abeel not only starts with the first letter of the alphabet, but with a "B" as the second letter always heads any list with which it is connected and oftentimes leads to bad situations, Mr. Abeel asserts.

For instance, in a delinquent property tax foreclosure notice, officially published Monday, the title of the suit is against Paul J. Abeel and others. Abeel, as always, the first name on any alphabetical list, gets the publicity and only an "et al" accounts for several score of additional defendants.

The worst part of the present situation is, Mr. Abeel states, that he is no longer a party to the suit, as the tax delinquency was cleared in 1939, but because his name headed the list on the original complaint it still gets top billing, although he has no connection with the action.
