

Cleveland Defeats Yankees Behind Feller's Pitching

By J. H. BAILEY (Associated Press Staff Writer) Bob Feller led the Cleveland Indians yesterday to a 2-1 decision over the New York Yankees in 10 innings. It was his sixth victory against two defeats this year and earned him all-time record against the Yankees at 11 won and the same number lost.

Feller allowed just six hits and fanned nine. The Indians scored off Russo in the second inning, but an unearned run by the Yankees in the sixth tied the score. Feller just clamped down till Bordman hit a homer in the tenth to win.

The Chicago White Sox named out the Boston Red Sox 3-2 and took over second place behind the Indians.

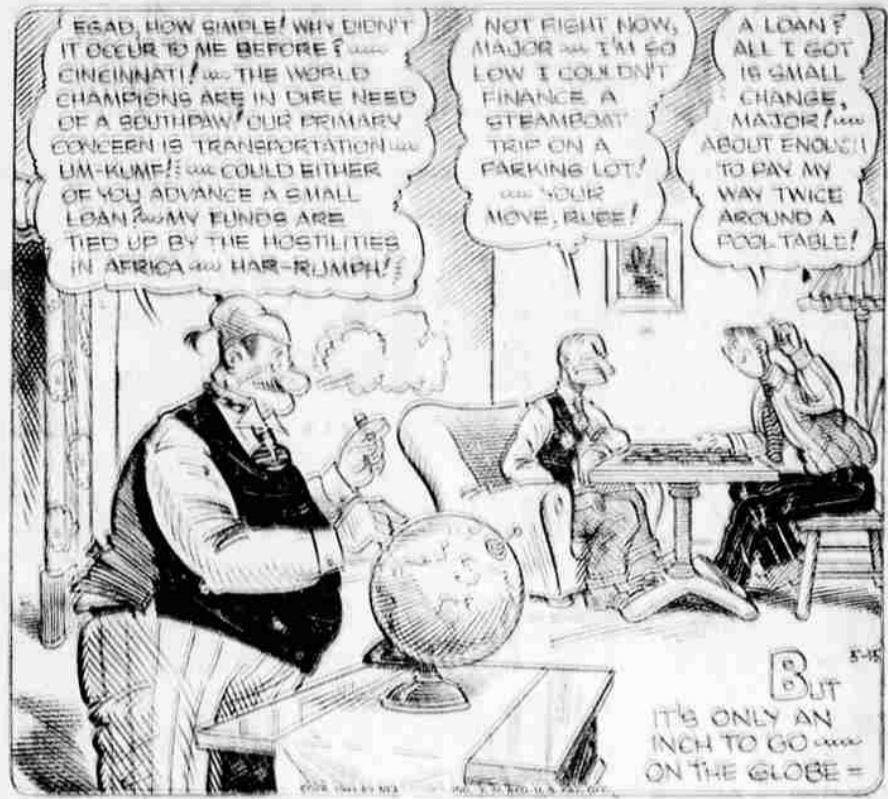
Dizzy Dean Quits Active Baseball

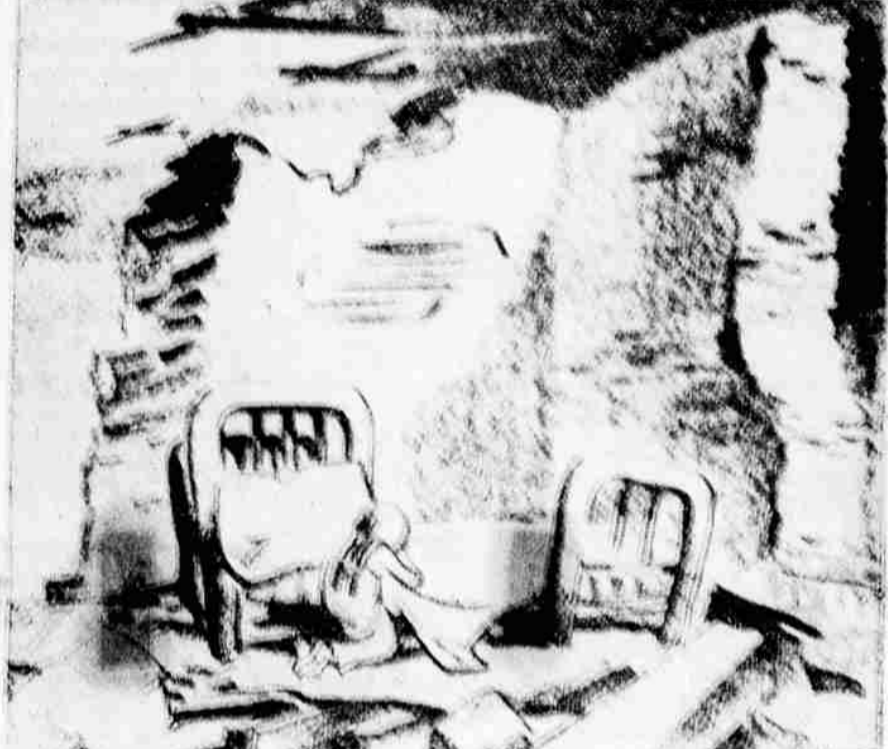

Hilcher, customarily an erratic performer, was stingiest with his safeties, giving up only five as the Beavers defeated Oakland, 4-1, in a series opener at the Oaks' park. He struck out 10.

Most freebanded was Hebert. He issued seven blows yet achieved the night's only shutout, blanking Los Angeles, 2-0.

Bittner came in between with six hits. These Seattle managed to convert into two runs but that was of little avail, for Hollywood, in the throes of a batting rampage, won 8-2.

The San Francisco at Sacramento game was rained out.

The contest at Oakland went undecided until the seventh inning, when Portland's roused Knip for five hits. The three runs that ensued gave the Beavers their margin of victory.

Seattle's defeat cost the Rainiers a tie for second place. That position now belongs solely by a game margin, to San Diego.
