

World War Vets' Compensation Data Presented

Statistics relative to compensation received by veterans who suffered disabilities from the world war were presented last night by Gaye Mowery, commander of the local post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Mr. Mowery spoke at a meeting of the committee in charge of the annual sale of Buddy Poppies, which will be offered the local public prior to Memorial day.

Of approximately four million veterans still living, less than one-tenth are receiving any compensation from the federal government. Mr. Mowery reported. From the total of 384,164 veterans receiving compensation, 120,000, he said, average only \$30 a month. There are approximately 500,000 disabled veterans, Commander Mowery said, who receive no help because they are unable to prove their disability is service-connected.

"The annual V. F. W. poppy sale is the one occasion of the year when the national organization invites the public to help in the care of the disabled veterans and the widows and orphans of the world war dead," the post commander said. "Every cent of the proceeds of the poppy sale is devoted to local relief, liaison work and the maintenance of the V. F. W. national home for widows and orphans or for the relief and welfare programs which the V. F. W. sponsors in behalf of disabled and needy veterans."

The local camp fire girls are aiding the V. F. W. sale of Buddy Poppies, and all who are to help in the sale are requested to register their names at the Grand Beauty parlor.

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Sees New Tie-Up Of Democracies

ROME, May 14.—(AP)—Fascist newspapers declared today that the British dominions were deserting England for the United States, with President Roosevelt turning toward a new "super-confederation" of Anglo-Saxon peoples whose capital would be at Washington.

This was their interpretation of Australian Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies' visit to Washington, as well as of a statement attributed to Premier Smuts of the Union of South Africa that the United States would enter the war and make its outcome certain.

"Here it is shown that the Anglo-Saxon world in its bellicose part is seeking its center of gravity at Washington and deserting London," the fascist editor, Virginio Gayda wrote in Il Giornale D'Italia.

In another editorial Gayda devoted nearly three columns to telling the United States that her involvement in the war would bring Japan into the conflict on the side of the axis powers.

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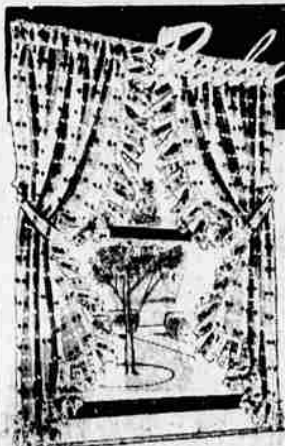
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
