

Gypsy Woman Is Jailed Here On Larceny Charge

Rose Nichols Miller, a 23-year-old gypsy, was under arrest here today and was held to the grand jury on a charge of larceny from the person. Sheriff Cliff Thornton stated the woman was one of a party of gypsies that stopped at Dr. J. B. McClure, retired railroad worker, where they could purchase a number of chickens.

While engaged in directing the group to a nearby poultry farm, McClure felt his purse containing \$50 being lifted from his shirt pocket, the sheriff said. McClure seized the woman, who was reported to have reached under his coat and into this shirt pocket. Thornton said, and wrested the purse from her.

Charles Miller, city marshal at Dr. J. B. McClure, followed the gypsies to Sutherland, where he arrested the woman and brought her to the county jail at Roseburg.

Bail was fixed in the sum of \$500 after she had waived preliminary examination in the justice court.

Mayor Hague Wins 7th Term in Jersey City

JERSEY CITY, N. J., May 14.—(AP)—Mayor Frank Hague, returned to office for his seventh consecutive four-year term by a staggering tide of ballots, hailed victory today as a "definite indication that the people of Jersey City are 100 per cent for Americanism."

The final unofficial count gave Hague, high man for the five city commission posts, 100,703 votes. His four fellow commissioners were swept back into office with slightly lower pluralities while David A. Nimmo, top candidate on the opposition fusion ticket, received 13,425 votes. Nevertheless, the Hague margin was 17,600 under the 1937 figure.

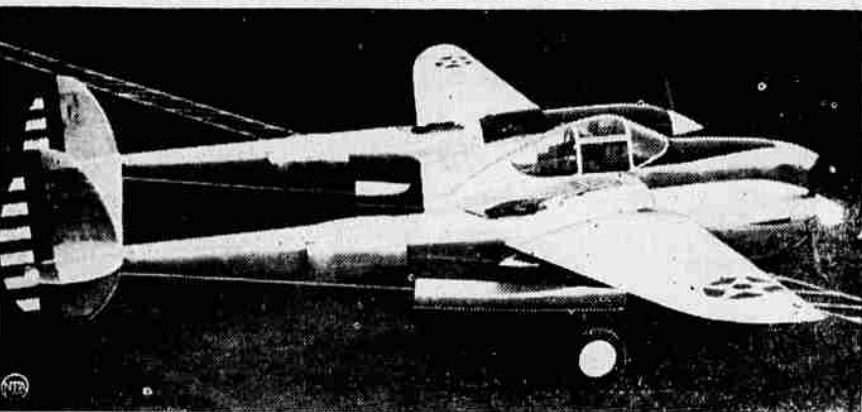
LONDON, May 14.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Eden bluntly warned Japan today that British economic restrictions against her would not be eased unless Japan
