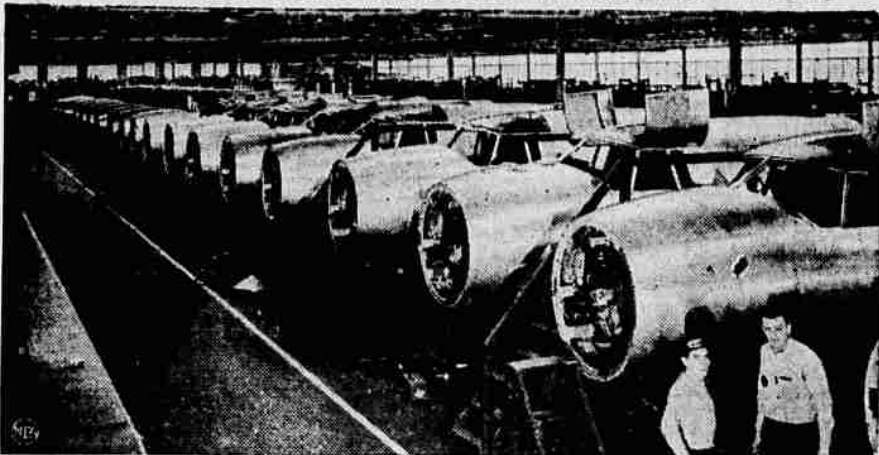

Fr. Lewis Soldier Faces Girl Attack Charge

OLYMPIA, May 15.—(AP)—Arraignment of Corporal Paul D. Morgan, 29, of Fort Lewis on charges of first degree assault was scheduled here today.

The Colorado soldier was arrested in connection with an assault on Miss Alice Roberts, a secretary in the state department of social security, Monday night near the old capitol building in downtown Olympia. Authorities said the attack was frustrated by Miss Roberts' furious resistance and her screams, which caused residents in the neighborhood to call police.

Miss Roberts was dragged from the sidewalk to a vacant lot. She was treated at a hospital for a dislocated jaw, facial bruises and cuts and shock. She said she was choked brutally.

Referendum Title for Textbook Law Assailed

SALEM, May 15.—(AP)—Ballot title for the referendum against the 1941 law loaning textbooks to private schools was assailed yesterday by Rep. Allan G. Carson of Salem and Sen. Rex Ellis of Pendleton, authors of the bill.

They charged that the ballot title is deceptive in that it gives the impression that the books would be given, rather than loaned, to private schools.

They also attacked use of the name "association against public taxes for private schools," appearing on the referendum petitions.

The court was asked to prepare a substitute ballot title.

Three Soldiers Drown In N. Y. Harbor Collision

NEW YORK, May 15.—(AP)—Three soldiers apparently drowned when the Fort Slocum launch Q-11 sank in the East river today after a collision with the Leigh Valley tug Claremont.

Army officials named the men as: Sergeant Henry J. Moroso, native of Columbia, S. C., skipper of the craft; private Melvin Calton, Kings Creek, Ky., and Private Clyde Fleming, 838 Peralto street, Pittsburgh.

The Q-11 had towed an army launch from Port Washington to Governor's island and was returning to New Rochelle when the unexplained collision occurred.
