

Bridges Accused Of Trying to Get Hold Of Govt. Records

WASHINGTON, May 15—(AP)—Testimony that Harry Bridges, west coast labor leader, tried to obtain confidential government files to thwart efforts to deport him as an alien was on file today with a senate subcommittee.

The testimony came from Major Lemuel B. Scofield, in charge of the immigration and naturalization service.

The justice department official, recently returned from the Bridges deportation hearing in San Francisco, told a senate judiciary subcommittee that Bridge's request for access to the records was denied by a federal judge but that proposed legislation might force disclosure of similar confidential information in future cases.

Major Scofield testified that the request by Bridges, who faces deportation charges under a new alien registration law, was "made ostensibly to enable the alien to investigate in advance the witnesses who were to be called against him to check on their statements in an effort to bolster the contention that the evidence was in a large respect unworthy and manufactured."

But Scofield told senators that officials here "are positively convinced that the real purpose was for the alien (Bridges) to concoct false alibis, false testimony, and endeavor falsely and corruptly to meet the evidence that was fairly presented against him."

The program will include instrumental and vocal music and will feature an address by the Rev. John A. Barney of Roseburg.

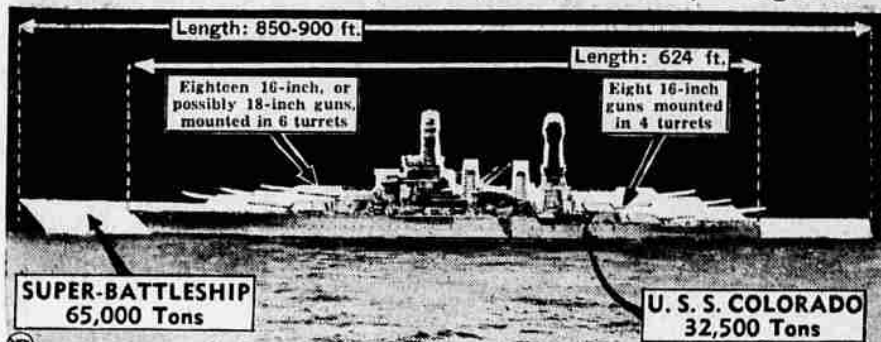

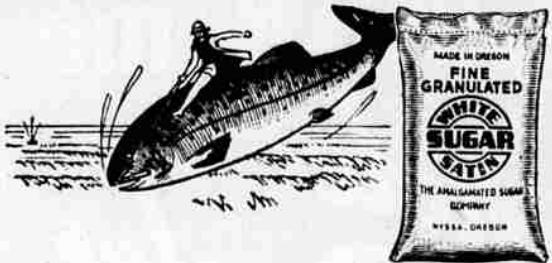

Quota Referendum On Wheat Means Much to Grower

The western Oregon diversified farmer has every bit as much at stake in the May 31 wheat quota referendum as the eastern Oregon large-scale wheat grower, E. F. Nichols, of Riddle, chairman of the county AAA committee, states.

Pointing out that AAA loans on

stored wheat have stabilized the American market when the world wheat market, glutted by a huge surplus, is in chaos, Nichols said that these loans are prohibited by law if the marketing quota is not approved.

"No wheat loans mean that the Oregon farmer will get nearer 30 cents a bushel than the present 80 cents for his wheat," the commit-

tee man declared. "To the wheat farmer, 30 cent wheat means ruin, and it means equally hard times for diversified farmers in Douglas county," Nichols said. "Cheap wheat means cheap grain of all kinds, and it

means that wheat farmers, unable to make a living growing wheat, will go into dairying, into hogs, into poultry, creating surpluses in other types of agricultural products."

Mr. Nichols advises Douglas county farmers to see their community committeemen for full information on the wheat quota elections.
